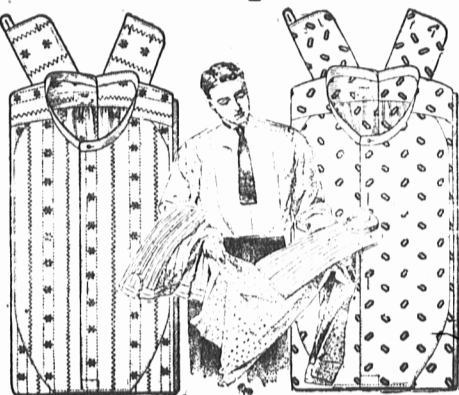
THE S S City of London brought a large cargo of eggs and 50 passengers from Vernon River, Brush, and Halliday's Wharves yesterday and returned again in the afternoon with a miscellaneous cargo for Brush and Halliday's Wharves. She will ply on West River tomorrow (Thursday) and East River on Friday.
