## Herman And Hartnett Lead Rally As Cubs Come From Behind To Wallop Giants 10-

### IN THIS CORNER

The hand injury suffered by Leo Kelly yesterday in a training session besides keeping the clever city boy out of action for nearly a month also robs him of the opportunity for the present at least, of testing his boxing ability against one of the best middleweights in the Maritimes in the person of Bobby Orr.

The unavoidable postponement of the bout was also a distinct disappointment of the fans who were eagerly looking forward to the scrap, and at the same time were anxious to see just how Kelly would stack up against an opponent whose ability inside the squared circle was unquestioned. But in the Hartnett-Sparks act that is being put on in its place said fans will likely witness a bout that will provide fireworks all the way through.

Sparks and Hartnett are no strangers to each other. There is a lot of keen rivalry between the pair of mitt-slingers that has extended over the past three years and during that time each has savored the other once. Local fans will have the opportunity of seeing the "rubber" match, a fight that will likely decide for all time the question of supremacy between the two.

Hartnett, a veteran of the game and at one time outstanding among Maritime mitt-slingers, is another two fighter. Ring-wise is every sense, Hartnett is a foe to be respected in every start. He may be outboxed by his opponent but there is always the possibility of him landing that devastating left hook and when this punch lands it is generally certain for the receiver of the wallop.

The fight is scheduled for ten rounds, or less, and much emphasis may be placed on the less part of it. A fight between two boys with the punching prowess that Hartnett and Sparks possess usually ends up with a ten count being tolled over one of them and this will likely be the case Monday night. Just what one will end up in a reeling pose looks very much like a toss-up.

The City Softball League is without a doubt the closest race ever staged in any branch of Island athletics. With practically half of the schedule completed all four teams today are tied for the top position and the manner in which the teams have been performing makes it a difficult matter for anyone to try and pick an ultimate winner.

Besides furnishing the stiffest competition the teams have also been dishing out the smartest brand of softball ever witnessed here. The games are all close-knit affairs with the "breaks" often deciding the outcome and as the teams round the halfway mark it will be interesting indeed to watch the battles that will be waged for playoff berths.

The Cape Breton Colliery Baseball League evidently isn't proving so popular with the fans. Reports have it that attendances are dwindling sharply and those behind the league are said to be angling to have the loop changed from a Class D rating to a Class C status.

The reason for this is that if the change takes place better players could be brought in. Class D is the lowest in professional baseball with a salary limit on each club. The better players naturally are allowed to hand out and while Class C also has a limit to the salaries to be paid nevertheless said limit is well in advance of the former and the change if it should take place would mean that players who are ineligible could be procured and thus make for a better brand of the game being played.

Certainly there is very little enthusiasm being shown toward the summer sport except in a few scattered points that include Liverpool, Yarmouth, Springhill and Hantsport, and the professional circuit that is progressing steadily in Cape Bre-

**CARDS WALLOP DODGERS**  
In St. Louis, the Cardinals battled around in two separate innings and came to the plate eight times in the third to wallop Brooklyn Dodgers 13-3 and wind up the series with two wins out of three.  
While Lefty Bob Weiland was allowing 12 hits, but handcuffing the Brooklyn with men on the base, the Gas House Gang, although hitting safely in only four innings, landed on Fred Frankhouse and George Jeffercoat for 14 safe blows, seven doubles and seven singles.

## St. Thomas Team Wins Rifle Shield With New Record

MONTREAL, Que., June 24—With the record-breaking aggregate score of 4783 out of a possible 5000, the St. Thomas, Ont., no. 1 rifle team won the 1936-37 indoor shield of the Canadian National Rifle Association today by W. E. Shepley, president of the association here. They scored an all-time high average of 99.65 out of a possible 100 per man for each target shot. Teams throughout the entire national system competed in the series which consisted of twelve matches.  
Teams from Montreal captured the next three places in the league, scoring 4788, 4738 and 4733. Kamloops, B. C., came fifth with 4725 and Toronto, Ont., last year's winners, were sixth with 4722.  
G. I. Orr, of St. Thomas dropping only two points, won the individual trophy with a record score of 1198 out of a possible 1200. J. N. Bradley, also of St. Thomas, came second with 1195, and W. Brass, of Prince Rupert, B. C., third with 1194.  
Further indications of the high caliber of the shooting in the league this year is shown by the fact that 18 men scored the system averaged 99, out of 100 or better throughout the season and 41 averaged 98 or better. The ladies were well up in the individual standing, led by Mrs. H. C. Wreford of Toronto, and Mrs. Helen Jamieson and Miss Helen White of Montreal all of whom were tied with scores of 1186 out of 1200 or an average of 98.83 out of 100 per match.

## Budge's Win Over French Ace Features Third Round Play In Wimbledon Tourney

WIMBLEDON, June 24—(CP)—Don Budge of the United States today blasted Christian Bousseau, French left-hander, off the courts in a third round match of the all-English Tennis Tournament and increased British fears that Fred Perry's relinquished title is due for a journey across the Atlantic.  
While all favorites advanced, Budge's 6-1, 6-4, 6-2 victory over the highly regarded Frenchman was so convincing that bookmakers quit taking bets on him at any price. "Why toss good money away?" one of them asked.  
Budge's most feared rivals, Baron Gottfried Von Cramm and Heinrich Henkel of Germany and H.W. "Bunny" Austin of Great Britain all entered the fourth round.  
Von Cramm was given a stiff fight by the Japanese, Jiro Yamagishi, 6-4, 6-4, 3-6, 6-4, and Austin had difficulty with young Jack Bromwich, Australia, before taking a 6-2, 4-6, 6-0, 8-6 win.  
Henkel joined the Australians, Jack Crawford and Vivian McGrath, in making it an unhappy day for the Yugoslavians. All three defeated players from that country. Henkel downed Perenc, 6-2, 6-2, 6-1; Crawford downed Franz Kukuljevic, 6-3, 6-2, 10-8, and McGrath tripped Josip Palada, 4-6, 6-3, 7-5, 6-2.  
Ladislav Hecht of Czechoslovakia defeated C. M. Jones, England, 8-6, 6-4, 6-3.  
The United States Davis Cup team advanced en masse into the round of 16 with Bryan Grant defeating E. R. Avery, Great Britain, 6-3, 6-4, 2-6, 6-2; Frank Parker winning from M. D. Deloford, Great Britain, 6-0, 6-1, 5-7, 8-6, and Gene Mako winning over the Chinese Davis Cup player, S. K. Kho, 3-6, 6-1, 6-2, 6-4.  
The crowd got so excited about Budge's game that they forgot their usual Wimbledon calm and raised a continuous comment that distracted the Californian to the extent he had to appeal to the umpire for quiet early in the second set.  
With Queen Mary an interested spectator, the British-French women's doubles team of Billy Yorke and Mme. Rene Mathieu scored a notable first round victory over Alice Marble and Katherine Winthrop, United States, 6-2, 6-4. It was the Queen Mother's first appearance at Wimbledon since the death of George V.  
The favored team of Helen Jacobs, United States, and Hilda Krahwinkel, Spelling of Denmark and Germany, defeated Mrs. A. H. Mellows and Mrs. K. J. Underwood, Great Britain, 8-6, 6-2. Jean Saunders, formerly of Calgary, teamed with Miss A. E. L. McCoskric of England to defeat Margery Middleton and Alice Burton, 6-1, 6-3.  
Tomorrow most of the fourth round men's singles games will be played and the third round of women's singles completed.

## Louis Offered Title Bout In London

(By The Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, June 24—Joe Louis' first actual cash offer to defend his world heavyweight crown arrived from London today as Mike Jacobs started jockeying to bring Max Schmeling into line for a bout with the Brown Bomber this fall.  
The London proposition was an offer of 42 1-2 per cent of the gate receipts, with a guarantee of \$15,000, (about \$75,000) for Louis to meet Jack Doyle or Len Harvey at Wembley Stadium any time after the second week in August. Back of it appeared Jacobs' first move to do something about the "championship" battle between Schmeling and Tommy Farr, British titleholder, at London's White City Arena, tentatively set for Aug. 9.  
Jacobs, who had planned a joint promotion with General A. C. Critchley of the White City group, to have been staged after the Louis-Braddock title match Tuesday night, only to learn that the British promoter had lined up Schmeling and Farr on his own hook started negotiations yesterday with A. Arthur Elvin for a rival attraction. The result was today's offer.  
The idea appears to be that an appearance by Louis in London within a few days of the Schmeling-Farr match would chill interest in the latter affair, with the result that Schmeling might decide to pass it up, coming to America instead to try to repeat his triumph of last summer over Louis, which is just what Jacobs and Louis want.
