

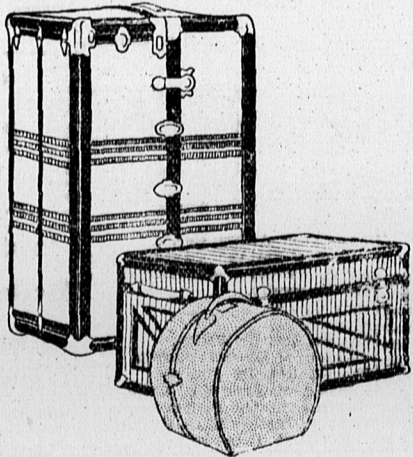

### IN MEMORIAM

Not many minutes after the hour of noon had gone by on the fifteenth day of July 1925, in the quiet of her own home surrounded by all her nearest and dearest ones Mrs. J. Not having been blessed with a very robust constitution it required practically all of her energy to carry on successfully the affairs of her own home, consequently she was not able to take any great part in the activities of the outside world and yet in her own quiet way she took a deep interest in all that pertained to the best interests of the surrounding community. But while many outside friends will greatly miss her genial and refined personality it is in the home that her loss will be felt most keenly. She was an ideal mother and in her own home was always the centre of attraction. Her companionship above that of all others was continually being sought for. Her very presence was productive of calm and restfulness.

To her beautiful home all worthy comers found a hearty welcome and no one needing cheer or comfort or help of any kind ever went away unaided.

But henceforth her loved ones will sigh but in vain for the touch of a vanished hand and long but to no avail for the sound of a voice that is still.

When the end drew near she remained calm and untroubled. She knew in whom she had believed and she was persuaded that He was able to keep what she had committed to His trust against that day. 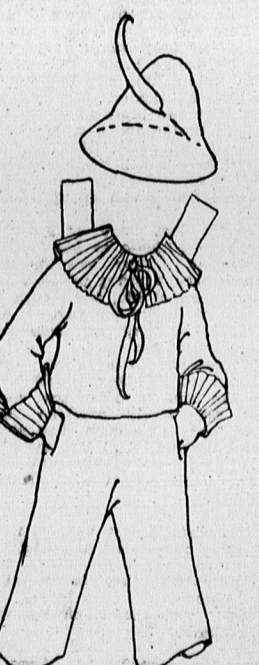

### HEAVY DEMAND FOR PASSPORTS

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 3.—Canadians are travelling abroad this summer to a greater extent than usual, judging by the number of passports issued. The heaviest movement is always in the months

of March, April and May, although granted were characterized by Dr. Schacht, President of the Reichsbank as premature. Negotiations since the opening of the St. Lawrence for the loan were begun last spring, once season the passport issue has averaged nearly three thousand a month. By the end of the year the total will aggregate over thirty thousand. As the fee has been raised to \$5, this becomes a rather substantial source of revenue.

LOAN FOR GERMAN FARMERS IS SOUGHT IN UNITED STATES

BERLIN, Aug. 3.—Coincident with the improved condition of German agriculture, produced by the proposed agrarian protective tariff and the tax measures now before the Reichstag, it is hoped that a loan of \$100,000,000 may be obtained from American banks for German farmers.
