(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—The United States is the only Maritime nation whose ships are less than the tonnage needs of the country's foreign commerce.

ADAPTATION OF THE CEREAL VARIETIES FOR DIFFERENT CONDITIONS

(Experimental Farms note.) Since varieties of grains may differ appreciably in structure, quality, earliness, resistance to disease and in the many other characters which go to distinguish them, it is logical to expect that they may perform differently under different conditions.

It is not a difficult task and requires only a small piece of ground not more than a square rod or two. The small amount of time required to sow, take notes on and harvest the crop will be more than repaid in the interest and information it will provide not only to the grower, but to his neighbours as well.

The Experimental Farms of the Federal Department of agriculture are encouraging this "local variety testing work" and now have a large number of co-operators working with them testing out different varieties in different parts of Canada according to a simple plan. It is hoped ultimately, with the mass of information available from this co-operative scheme, to plot out the zone the districts where certain varieties give the most promise. It may be possible for instance, to determine more definitely the Marquis zone, the Garnet zone, the Renfrew zone or the zones where some other variety may be grown with greatest profit.

Since conditions within a given zone may vary considerably farmers would always be well advised to do a certain amount of testing, especially as new promising productions by reliable institutions are reported.

Population Of N. B. Estimated At 403,000

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 27.—Vital statistics for the year 1925 in Canada just issued as the fifth annual report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, show that in that year New Brunswick is credited with having the highest birth rate, the highest infant mortality rate, the lowest maternal death rate of any province in the Dominion. Quebec is excluded from these statistics as its vital statistics records date only from 1926.

The population of New Brunswick is estimated in 1925 as at 403,000. Births totalled 10,949 that year, a rate of 27.2 per 1000 of population. The infant mortality rate is given at 100.1; the maternal mortality at 4.7 per 1000 live births. Prince Edward Island with a rate of 8.4, had the highest maternal mortality.

Deaths in N. B. in 1925 totalled 4,969, the rate being 12.3. Marriages number 2,984, or 7.2 per 1000 while in the eight provinces the total of marriages was 47,217 and the general rate 7 per 1000 of population.

Confirms News ROME, Feb. 27.—The Vatican confirms news that John McCormick, noted tenor, had been named a papal count. His qualifications for the honor are stated to be that he was a celebrated Catholic artist and a generous contributor to Catholic charity.

Baptist District Meeting

The District Conference of the Prince Edward Island Baptist churches met at Hazelbrook on Feb. 15 and 16, the first session opening on Wednesday evening with a devotional service led by Rev. R. W. Lindsay, the Moderator. Three new ministers, Rev. Dr. L. J. Tingley, Rev. H. M. MacGibbon and Mr. H. B. Lindsay were welcomed to the fellowship and the work of the Baptist churches of the Island.

Rev. H. M. MacGibbon, of Summerside, preached an inspiring and a thought-provoking sermon from Mark 16:16; in pleasing manner and well-chosen words, tracing the history of the Christian church from the beginning until the present, and showing that the gospel is still the remedy for the ills of the world.

With Mr. MacGibbon on the platform were: Rev. Dr. Tingley, Rev. R. C. Eaton, Rev. A. MacLeod, Rev. W. R. MacWalker, Rev. R. W. Lindsay and pastor H. B. Lindsay. On Thursday morning, Rev. A. A. MacLeod led a devotional service, choosing the opening verses of Romans 8 as the topic of meditation.

Rev. R. C. Eaton read a paper entitled "Our Irreligious Age." The paper was not as pessimistic as the title might suggest. Mr. Eaton, in his characteristic clear and finished style, held up the present age before the mirror of unbiased criticism, and left his audience feeling that the shortcomings of our generation were not reasons for discouragement, but rather challenges to advancement.

Dr. Tingley introduced the subject of Island Home Missions, showing how new methods could be used to great advantage in furthering the work of the churches. Dr. Tingley was master of his subject, as he has been engaged in Home Mission work for several years with marked success. On Thursday afternoon, pastor H. B. Lindsay, led a devotional service after which the Women's Mission Aid Society convened, conducted by Mrs. Isabella Glidden, of Summerside, assisted by Mrs. R. H. Jenkins and Miss Rhoda Wood. Mrs. Glidden reviewed the work of the Island provinces in her usual painstaking and interesting manner, and also presented the claims of Acadia University on the Women's Society. Dr. Tingley also spoke on the work of Acadia, the training place of mind, heart and soul for the young people under her influence. In a heart-stirring manner, the speaker told of the work in the Maritime Provinces that challenges the best that is in the youth of today. Miss Sadie Jones, Miss Wood and Mrs. Glidden read papers setting forth the need in foreign countries, and making heart-touching appeals to the people of this favored land to respond to the call for help from far away peoples.

On Thursday evening, Rev. A. A. MacLeod spoke on the work of the Temperance Alliance, calling attention to the activities of the Alliance for the last few months, and outlining the temperance program for the immediate future.

Rev. Dr. Tingley was again called to the platform. Choosing as the thought of the evening "The Name of Jesus," Dr. Tingley held the audience in rapt attention while he dwelt on all the activities of life and that is all sufficient in death.

A pleasing feature of this service was the receiving of Mr. Henry Bell Lindsay into the membership of the church of which his brother, Rev. R. W. Lindsay is pastor, and the granting him, upon examination, a license to preach the gospel. The Lindsay brothers are natives of Scotland. Rev. R. W. Lindsay has been pastor of the Hazelbrook Baptist church for nine years. Here he is admired because of his intellectual attainments and loved because of his genuine manliness and his never-failing devotion to his Divine Master, and far beyond the borders of his congregation does his influence extend, for he occupies an enviable place in the hearts of, not only the people of his own denomination, but of those of other denominations as well. We welcome a younger Mr. Lindsay to Canada and to our Christian activities. On the threshold of his chosen vocation, we wish him God-speed, confident that the good impression he has already made will be sustained and strengthened in the years to come.

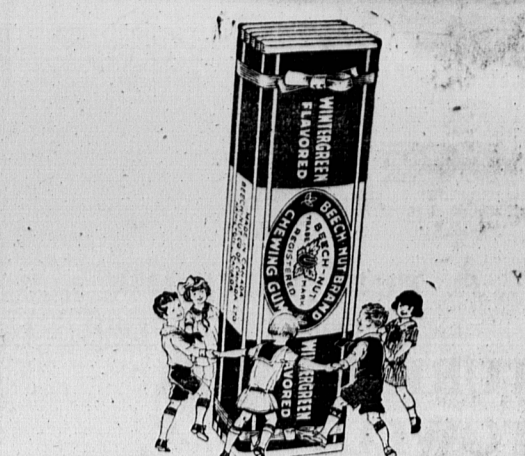
