RUSSIA IN MANCHURIA.

A very serious question has arisen among the great powers owing to Russia's new demands upon China, which the latter has refused to consider, and which have been referred to the European powers and Japan for consideration. The Russian demands amount to a practical assumption of the sovereignty of Manchuria and an abrogation of the "open door" policy so far as that great province is concerned. Russia had joined with the other great powers in affirming the equal right of all to trading privileges in China and Manchuria, but had reserved the right of temporary occupation by her military of certain designated posts which were to be evacuated on completion of the railway through that country, such military occupation being held to be necessary for the successful completion of the work.

And within the time specified Russia did evacuate the military posts she held at the time the treaty was made. But she built great barracks at each railway station and to these she has transferred her troops, now designated as railway police, reinforcing their numbers until she now has a vast army in Manchuria. Thus established she has set up her new pretensions and made the new demands above referred to, which China is powerless to resist. It is believed a joint protest will be made by Britain, the United States, Japan and perhaps by Italy against the notorious breach of faith on the part of Russia. France is expected to support the game of her great northern ally. Germany appears indifferent, while Japan is greatly in earnest about the Russian aggression. Whether the Anglo-American-Japanese opposition will go farther than a vigorous protest may be questioned as to push it to the extent of actual hostilities might involve the world at arms.

Russia is apparently playing the game of more than Carthaginian treachery in her repeated violation of treaty obligations. She has chosen her own time for action. She can easily place a half million men in Manchuria by a line of communication which cannot be cut off or interfered with. Britain has her "little war" in Somaliland to deal with. The King is about to visit Paris, the gay capital of the Russian ally. War in the far East would involve enormous cost of transportation for Britain or the United States, and the English speaking peoples greatly prefer peace to war. So it may be that the protest of the interested powers may not be backed by military force, in which case the conscienceless aggressive methods of Russia will have full swing. The outlook is not pleasant to contemplate.

THE BRITISH BUDGET.

The British budget has had a favorable effect upon the national securities and consols at once advanced to 92½. It was indeed a highly favorable statement which the Chancellor of the Exchequer made. He was able to announce a surplus, and to follow it with a large decrease in taxation. The reduction of four pence on the pound of the income tax strikes off \$42,500,000, and the abolition of the corn tax \$12,500,000 more from the annual tax burdens, a total relief of \$55,000,000 or the equivalent of \$1.25 per head for the population of the United Kingdom.

There are other features of interest in the Chancellor's statement. The total cost of the wars in South Africa and China, which were running concurrently, was \$1,085,000,000. The charge for the reduction of the national debt is \$135,000,000, and if it is not augmented the debt will be wiped out in fifty years. Thus it will be seen, after greatly reducing the recent tax burdens, the national debt can not only be easily carried, but provision is at once made for its steady and rapid reduction. The estimated expenditure for 1903-4 is \$721,655,000, a reduction of \$160,140,000 as compared with 1902. The estimated receipts are \$778,850,000, and the estimated surplus for the year about \$57,200,000. Neither the sugar, coal nor tea taxes will be interfered with for the present. An interesting feature is the estimated receipt of \$4,685,000 on Suez Canal account for the coming year.

On the whole the Imperial Budget is an exceedingly favorable one, and much more favorable than had been expected at home or abroad.
