IN THIS CORNER

Going through a brisk workout as a large crowd of fans watched a performance, Leo Kelly last night stated he was ready for his ten-round scrap with Earle Kinsman of Berwick, a fight which takes place at the Forum tonight, and which shares the headlines with another ten-round battle, the George Leslie-Stan Biggar fight for the Island heavyweight championship, a crown which Leslie now holds.

Kinsman, looking to be in the pink of condition arrived on the Island yesterday at noon. He too is anxious for the bell that will send him into action and although he has never seen the local boy perform nevertheless the Berwick mitt-slinger is looking for a very tough battle.

The card promises to be well attended. Last night the Labor Union Hall housed an almost capacity crowd as the boys went through their final workouts, a happening that presages a good turnout of fans. The Kelly-Kinsman scrap is attracting just as much interest, if not more, than the heavy battle, and while this is unusual in a sense, nevertheless, Leslie and Biggar will have plenty of their followers scattered throughout the big crowd that is expected to attend.

Biggar on the eve of his third meeting with Leslie was once again confident of lifting the crown. Down to 185 pounds the local heavyweight looked as if he was ready to go through another gruelling battle such as the one that took place the last time the pair met only this time the challenger avers the ending will be very much different.

Pointing straight ahead Biggar refuses to think of the last fight. His training this time has largely been a matter of perfecting his defense before and Biggar like a lot of his followers feels certain that he has the necessary ammunition in either hand to hang a kayo on the ruler of the Island heavyweights.

Leslie was on the scene of battle early yesterday and once again predicting a successful defence of his title. This time the Souris boy is going out to halt for all time the persistent challenger who he can do it a lot earlier tonight but from this corner it appears likely that the scrap will be another tough affair. How it will end—well, that is another matter.

Although not taking part in tonight's card there was a fighter working out last night who drew a lot of attention. Bennie Binns was the boy in question and although there is no fight in the offing for him at present words, "I am not going to be caught napping."

It wasn't hard either to guess what he meant. For a long time now Binns has been angling for a scrap with Leo Kelly but every time arrangements seem about completed some unavoidable happening turns up to halt the match. It appears likely however that the pair will go to it in the near future and it will certainly be the fight the fans have been waiting for.

For a long time it was taken for granted that Binns was the best fighter on the Island. Then along came Kelly with several brilliant performances in the squared circle. True it was at the time Bennie seemed on the way down the ladder but now that is all changed.

Binns started a comeback that has been highly successful, climaxed with a victory over Bobby Orr recently. Kelly has been on the shelf with a damaged hand but in his workouts for his fight with Kinsman tonight, Leo has shown all of his undoubted ability. Binns is at the peak of his form and the only way the two would be to say it is "natural."

With weather conditions interfering with the playing of the first game on the scheduled date and motor trouble causing a postponement yesterday with ideal weather prevailing it appeared last night that Stellarton Monarchs and Charlottetown Rovers would complete their Maritime semi-final football series this morning at the Victoria Park diamond.

Held up at Amherst the missing Nova Scotian players arrived in the city early last evening and when Manager "Boots" Frame of Stellarton and Ev McNeill of the Rovers got together it was decided that the game or games be played this morning at 11 o'clock, rain or shine in order to allow the visitors to leave for home tomorrow afternoon on the last crossing of the car ferry.

Laurent and Jennings were with the senior Ontario Hockey Association champions, Dominions.

Murph Chamberlain, member of last year's Allan Cup champions, Sudbury Tigers, and Bill Thomson, starry Port Arthur winger, both of whom have been signed to Toronto contracts, also were in the party.

C.A.H.A. Survey Reveals Bright Hockey Prospects; Pros Seek Re-instatement

OTTAWA, Oct. 18—Amateur hockey throughout Canada should enjoy one of its best seasons during 1937-38, it was indicated by reports to the office of Cecil Duncan, President of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

Most promising reports come from the Maritimes. Bill Gill and Dud James, of the Moncton Hawks, have applied for reinstatement and if their requests are granted will play with one of the strong teams the east expects to send out on the Allan Cup trail again.

A new playoff arrangement will affect the Maritimes. In the future, the Quebec Province or the Ottawa and District champions will travel East to meet the winners of the Maritime title, instead of the latter visiting them for the playoff.

Seek Re-instatement

More than a dozen professionals have applied for amateur cards in Quebec, and the province will have two senior loops this season, instead of one. The provincial league, an intermediate circuit last season, has been given senior status. The Quebec Senior League, formerly the Montreal Senior Group, is the other.

Dal Tennis Team Retains Championship

HALIFAX, Oct. 18—Dalhousie University tennis team retained the Maritime intercollegiate championship here today by defeating Mount Allison University court stars, 14 matches to four. One match was not finished.

The Halifax college has dominated the tri-province tennis loop for several years, but its supremacy was seriously threatened last season when the New Brunswick University held them to a draw. Dal retained the title, however.

The feature match of the series today was the first men's singles between Mount Allison's ace, Don Robinson of Moncton, N. B., and Hugh Little, Dal's no. one man who is Eastern Canada junior singles champ. The New Brunswicker, after dropping the first set, before the steady stroking of the Haligonian, pulled up his game to win the second and third sets, both in over-time.

Lester Patrick Reorganizes Ranger Squad

WINNIPEG, Oct. 18—Reorganization of New York Rangers was virtually completed today even to changing sweater numbers, Manager Lester Patrick said.

His young National Hockey League squad will have only three more practices before beginning their 2,300-mile tour of the Canadian Prairies to participate in six exhibition games with Red Dutton's New York Americans.

Rebuilding of Rangers, begun two years ago, resulted in Patrick dispensing with playing services of the last of the original team of 1926.

Newcomers were developed through Patrick's key system—annual school, Rovers, amateur team of New York, the minor league Philadelphia Ramblers and then Rangers.

The "kid" line, Neil and Mac Colville and Alex Shibicky, the defence pair Babe Pratt and Joe Cooper and forward Phil Watson all graduated through the system. Now, Bobby Kirk, Clint Smith and Byron Hextall, former first string players with Vancouver Lions, Pacific Coast professional team and Ramblers, become members of Rangers.

O'ed active player with the team is Melville (Butch) Keeling, now beginning his 10th season. Cecil Dillon and Ott Heller, start their eighth and Art Coulter, and goalie Dave Kerr begin their third as members of Rangers.

In revising the numbers of sweaters, Frankie Boucher gets number 17 instead of seven, which he wore for 11 seasons. Phil Watson, wily centremen of the Lyons Patrick, Watson, Dillon line, will have number seven this winter.

Dear Sir:—

Since the Maritime Province Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada has declared war on the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, according to the headings appearing in a number of Maritime newspapers, I would ask you to kindly publish the letter following, giving it equal prominence, if you consider it to be of interest to your sport readers:—

Some weeks ago, Sheriff Shipley, the Secretary of the M. P. B. A. U. of Canada sent out a circular letter to all hockey clubs in the Maritimes requesting their support in organizing a governing body for Maritime hockey this coming season of 1937-38.

On October 6th, a meeting of the M. P. B. A. U. was held in Amherst, and according to newspaper reports, that association proposes to take over the control of hockey in the Maritimes. President McDonald is quoted as saying, "That players who were identified with the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association this winter would not be eligible to take part in baseball and other sports fostered by the M. P. B. A. U. declaration from me that players registered with the M. A. H. A. will not be permitted to participate in sport activities under the jurisdiction of the M. P. B. A. U. which is
