MONTREAL, Dec. 21.—A German prisoner of war at the Immigration headquarters on St. Antoine street created such a fuss Wednesday night that guards were rushed down stairs, and he was closely watched. The excitement began when the man was informed that he was going to be taken to the prison camp at Petawawa. Immediately he heard it, he began to dash his head against the wall. His wife who was in the same room shrieked, bringing the guards down. The man was dazed, but not seriously injured.

KAISER'S FRIEND SAFE.

LONDON, December 21.—During the bombardment of Scarborough, Lady Lonsborough was at her husband's residence in the very centre of the town. Her husband and she are personal friends of the Kaiser, whom they entertained in London three years ago, while Prince Henry of Prussia was their guest at Scarborough the year previous, accompanied by Admiral Count Munster. The Lonsboroughs' residence, though forming a conspicuous target had a wonderful escape, suffering no injury whatever, though buildings on both sides were badly destroyed.

SLEEP-WALKER IN NIGHT PARADE CUTS OFF CURLS

BRASHEAR, Mo., December 21.—The mystery of what became of the pretty flaxen curls of Miss Corda Loft who lost them while she slept in her home has been solved. The curls were found in a suit case under her bed, and because of a dream which she recalls having that night she is convinced that she cut them off herself while walking in her sleep.

The loss of the young woman's hair discovered when she arose and found what was left badly bobbed, has furnished one of the principal topics of conversation here since. "I remember dreaming that I was going to leave Brashear and that I was packing my grip," she said in recounting her experience for the several hundredth time.

"Look in the suit case when, suggested one of her practical heaters. And in the suit case was the missing hair and the scissors, which the young lady had wielded on it. Miss Loft has been a somnambulist for several years and has had a number of queer adventures while walking in her sleep.

350 POUND MAN FALLS TO DEATH

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Samuel Boyle 50 years old, weighing 350 pounds fell from the fifth story of the Victoria Hotel at No. 90 Bowery to the roof of a one story extension.

Feeling ill early in the morning, Boyle arose and went to the window for air. He fell out of the window, and when he struck the roof of the extension the noise was heard by a clerk who notified the police. Two policemen, three persons living in the hotel, and an ambulance surgeon carried him down, but it was necessary to remove a window with its frame before he could be taken from the roof.

"Why don't you get the fire department?" said Boyle jocularly as the men tried to lift him. "They've got a good derrick I believe."

When taken to Bellevue Hospital he became unconscious and it developed that he had suffered internal injuries. He died a few hours later.

SENSES PARALYZED BY SHOCK OF FIRE.

LONDON, Dec. 21.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The extraordinary effects of shell fire upon those who are forced to undergo it, are being discussed at length in the British medical journals.

An English surgeon now attached to a Paris hospital reports the cases of four men who show absolutely no trace of bodily wounds, but who are now struck deaf and dumb by shell explosions; neither of them has anything wrong with his organs of speech or hearing, but is suffering simply from shock. A third cannot see, caused by a nervous shock. There is nothing the matter with his eyes and complete recovery is promised after a period of quiet and rest.

The fourth man's experience left his mind blank. Field Surgeons contributed accounts of the manner in which death comes from shell fire. In some cases men are found stiff in death in life-like attitudes, so that the stiffness, characteristic of a corpse must have come on at the very moment of death.

Some of the field surgeons have attributed this to the action of a poisonous gas given off by the new explosive, "turpentine." One of the pathologists at Guy's Hospital, however, contradicts that theory.

DUDLEY ARRIVES AT STATE PRISON.

THOMASTON, Me., Dec. 21.—Dr. Lionel E. Dudley, under sentence of from ten to twenty years for the death of Mildred Sullivan, began serving his term at the State prison tonight.

"I shall try to take my medicine like a man," the Presque Isle physician said, as he entered the prison with Sheriff Bryson. "It will be my aim to conduct myself as to shorten my term as much as possible."

Dr. Dudley was granted all possible freedom by the officers during the long journey from Houlton. He was not manacled at any time and read and smoked at will.

EUGENIC BOY AN ELEVEN POUNDER.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 21.—The first offspring of a Wisconsin eugenic marriage has been recorded. It's a boy, weighs 11½ pounds, and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward MacDonaid, of Washburn.

"They were the first couple to be eugenically married in that country, and the first couple wedded in the state, where the bride, as well as the bridegroom, passed the eugenic law test, though the law provides only for the bridegroom's being tested.

The State Health Department had a chance to try its much discussed intention of requesting the parents of the eugenic babe to name the child Eugene, or Eugenie, as circumstances might require.

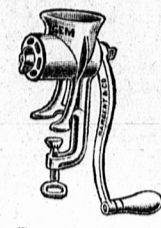

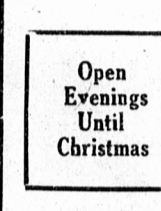
