THE PROHIBITORY LAW.

For some reason not explained, shortly before the Exhibition the official prosecutor appointed by the Government for the enforcement of the Prohibitory Law, who had been before doing very little, ceased to do anything. About the same time by executive order, a notorious violator of the law who had been imprisoned for a third offence, was released from jail on some pretext that confinement was injurious to his health. Possibly the prosecutor thought it hardly worth while after this occurrence to be very zealous in prosecuting offenders who could find so easy a method of escape. Be that as it may apparently no effort was made to enforce a compliance with the law, and several of the older and more notorious offenders were selling in full blast during the Exhibition and since.

The Government which introduced and by its supporters in the Legislature enacted the Prohibitory Law, gained credit among the temperance people of the Island for their good work. They at the same time became obligated to make a reasonable effort to see that the law should be enforced. In the latter duty they have greatly failed and have sadly disappointed the friends of law and order in this city and throughout the Island. "How not to do it" has been the apparent study of the present prosecutor. A hundred times in a day an individual rum-seller has violated the law, and yet the prosecutor finds no grounds upon which to base a complaint.

It is the more obligatory upon the Government to take notice of the repeated violations of the law in this city because it is here that the Executive has its seat, here its meetings are held and here several of its prominent members, including the Premier, reside. It is incredible that they do not know that the law is openly violated every day. We are compelled to believe that the inaction of the local prosecutor and the second unlawful release of a rum-seller from jail reflects the real attitude of the dominant element of the Government toward prohibition. There is no doubt a divided house on this matter. We believe there are several members of the Government who would like to see the law enforced. There are other members who would rather destroy the Act than see it fulfil its purpose, and would strangle their own law but for public opinion.

The time has come for plain speaking. A condition of things has arisen which cannot be tolerated. If the rum interest is to control the Government of the country let us have the fact clearly understood, and we shall know what to do. The Temperance Alliance do well to take counsel together at such a time, and upon the result of their deliberations, much will depend. We shall return to the subject.

ANOTHER PHYSICIAN CALLED.

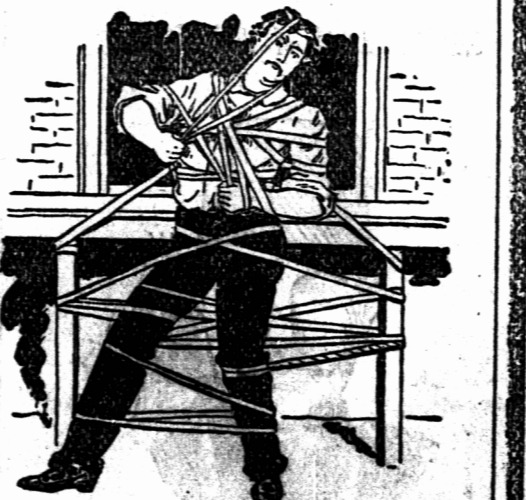
WASHINGTON, September 28.—Secretary Cartleyou at 3.30 this afternoon issued the following statement: "Dr. Newton M.
