POULTRY NOTES

POULTRY NOTES. Submitted by the POULTRY DIVISION OF DOMINION LIVE STOCK BRANCH. This information given in the interests of better farm flocks. All inquiries to be addressed to Box 200, Charlottetown.

INCUBATION

The importance of replacing the farm flock is a factor that should receive consideration from small poultry producers. Poultrymen attending to their flocks call out approximately one-third each year. These birds are usually unprofitable hens, such as old ones, and low producers. Then there is the loss through death. These losses should be replaced each spring to keep flock up to 100 hens, which is an economical unit for any farm. Under average conditions hens lay highest during their first year of production, which production decreases gradually each succeeding year.

As a disease control measure the replacement of the flock is an important item, because it is a well known fact that tuberculosis and other diseases are more prevalent in old birds. One can readily see that it is important to call the flock both from the standpoint of egg production, and disease. The renewing of one-third of the flock each year is a very important problem in poultry raising. It is one of the common attributes to failure on the part of many beginners.

Incubation and brooding determine to a great extent the profits to be made from laying pullets when they reach maturity. Higher mortality among chicks can often be attributed to poor incubation, while there are other factors which play a vital part, such as inferior quality of breeding stock, diseases, and poor methods of brooding. The best measure of one's ability as a poultry raiser is the number of fully matured chicks raised in proportion to the number of eggs set. The success of incubation depends directly on the source of egg supply for hatching, and also involves the breeding stock. It is safe to state that the quality of the young stock is directly dependent upon the quality of the breeding stock. The two methods of hatching eggs are generally referred to as Natural and Artificial Incubation.

The Natural method requires the use of the hen, and involves the natural instinct of the hen during brooding. The artificial method requires the use of the incubator. Each method has advantages, and disadvantages. During recent years the incubator has played an important part in the development of the poultry industry, because of the fact that the outstanding advantage of the incubator over the broody hen is that the chicks can be hatched in larger units, thus putting the cost of hatching on a more economical basis. When incubators are used for hatching, there is less danger of chicks becoming infected with lice, parasites, and other such diseases, generally attributed to the old hen. Taking all factors into consideration, it is evident that under average conditions hatching chicks in incubators is not only more satisfactory, but also more economical, particularly where large numbers are hatched. The incubator has a decided advantage in being able to hatch a few or several hundred chicks at a time, and these hatches can be arranged in such a way that a benefit is obtained from the standpoint of maturity of the pullet stock in time for winter lay.

NATURAL INCUBATION

When the hen is used for incubation of the eggs it is often difficult to get early hatches since the time of setting will depend entirely upon the instinct of the difference of the days when the hens are set. With poultry becoming an important factor as a revenue producer on the farms the time of hatching in order to obtain the most satisfactory results becomes very important.

Pullets must reach maturity in the fall, if winter production is going to be obtained from them. The time of hatching depends on the section of the country and weather conditions. For Prince Edward Island, April 15th, to June 15th is a suitable time. Chicks should never be hatched after June 15th. One of the advantages of natural incubation is the fact that less initial expense is involved. Some claim that the chicks are more vigorous. This has never been proven. With the increased tonnage of poultry being produced it is hardly possible that this tonnage be maintained by the use of the hen alone.

The use of hens to hatch the chicks is practical on many farms, when the number of chicks is small, or when the supply of eggs is extremely limited. If adequate artificial brooding equipment is not available then the hen should be used.

You get all the chicks that you want at one time, saving all the confusion, bother and expense of attending to several lots of chicks of different ages. 3. You get healthy uniform chicks. Any reputable dealer culls out all his weaklings or inferior stock. The chicks you hatch yourself you take as they come, good, bad, or indifferent. 4. Chicks are hatched in the most up-to-date machines, and are supplied with the best regulated heat, air and moisture. Hatching is under the care of highly trained men.

5. You can buy better chicks as a rule at a less price than your own, hatching costs you. If a producer hatches good chicks he must buy good eggs or hatch from specially kept matings.

6. You run no risks of a total failure. You don't wake up in the morning to find your incubator lamp out, and your three weeks labor, as well as eggs, a loss.

In all methods of securing chicks there are advantages and disadvantages. Brooders should read and choose intelligently. Next week the care of incubator and hen will be discussed.
