The remains of the late Mrs Allan McDonald of Harmony, who passed away at the City Hospital, Tuesday, were forwarded to her late home yesterday morning.

The Regina Standard reports that J. H. Haslam of P. E. Perfectly resigned to her Heavenly Father's will she could say "Thy will be done." She was a devoted and consistent member of the Methodist church and her sympathy and presence will be greatly missed in the home, church and community. She leaves to mourn their loss a husband, five children three sisters and three brothers, also several step-children. The funeral service, conducted by the Rev H. Pierce, on Oct 31st, was held in the Methodist church where she so often worshipped. A very large number of relatives, friends and neighbors were in attendance to pay their respect to one who was highly esteemed among them.

What very nearly resulted in a serious fire happened in the Methodist Church, Pownal, about 10.30 one night recently. It is quite probable that had the fire burned through the wainscoting the church would have been devoured by the flames and likely several other buildings near by. As it was the corner of the building was badly scorched. It is remarkable that the two men who were in the church at the time escaped with very slight burns. It has been decided to install a new lighting plant in the near future.
