Mrs. Frank Jardine, of Bradabane, has received the following letters regarding the wounding of Pte. Reginald Jardine:—

32 Stationary Hospital, Sept. 30th, 1918.

Dear Mrs. Jardine, Your son, Pte. R. Jardine, has been admitted into this hospital, with a wound of the right shoulder, and is still ill. Everything possible is being done for him, and I will write again in a few days, and let you know how he is.

Dear Mrs. Jardine, I wrote you yesterday saying your son was in here with a shoulder injury—it was found afterwards that there was injury to the spine and it was deemed advisable to transfer him at once to England. He went this morning. I hope he goes on well but have no means of letting you know anything further. He will let you know from there where he has been sent to.

The contents will be, as nearly as possible, the following:— 1 lb tin Roast Beef 1/2 lb tin Sausage or Bacon 1 lb tin Turkey or Fowl 1 lb tin Xmas Pudding 1/2 lb Tea 1/2 lb Loaf Sugar 1 lb tin Milk 1 tin Sardines in Oil 1/4 lb pkt Plain Chocolate 2 pkts Wrigley's Chewing Gum 1/2 lb tin Dripping 1/2 lb Carton Biscuits 1/2 lb tin Cheese 1 Reart Turtle Soup Square 1 pkt 2 Dried Eggs 1 Cake Brown Windsor Soap Tobacco or Cigarettes Tobacco or Cigarettes Xmas Card The Provincial Treasurer, (Canon Simpson, Charlottetown) will be glad to receive donations for this purpose.

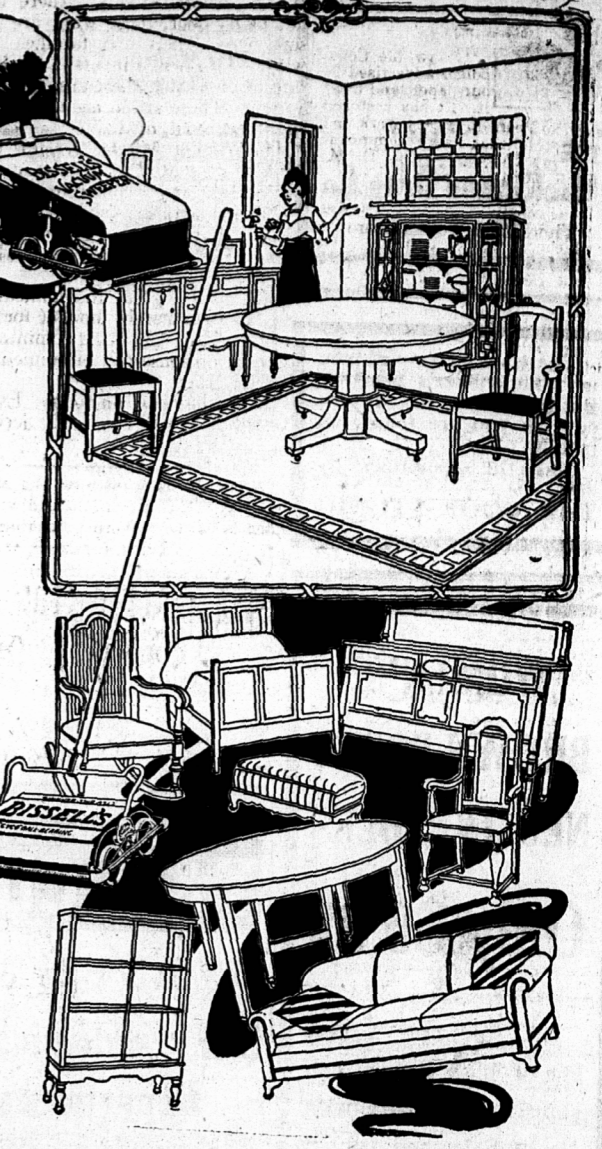
