**MUSICAL MUSINGS**

**by HECTOR CHARLESWORTH**

A most important development this year has been the "come-back" of high grade recording instruments, after a period of neglect. As should not be forgotten that by these means good music long before radio and television existed. Re-birth of public interest in a healthy and musical progress.

October releases of Victor Records keep pace with the new musical values involved could not be better demonstrated than by that of the great soprano, Kirsten Flagstad, singing the tragic aria "Monstrous Fiend" from Beethoven's "Fidelio" (RED SEAL, 1972). The true quality and colour of her voice is more fully revealed than in any broadcast of hers that I have listened to. Admirable also, are two "Gramophone" episodes (RED SEAL, 1936) sung by the gifted Brazilian mezzo, Bruna Castagna. Especially memorable is her low tones in the scene from Act III when the enchantress reads death in her cards. John Charles Thomas' vocal splendour, and perfect French diction, are manifest in two lyrics (RED SEAL, 15184) of which the best is "Holmes" entitled "As Pays" is appropriate just now.

Gifted Canadiana figure in new instrumental releases, Benjamin Stewart, eminent conductor and pianist, makes his first appearance in Victor catalogues with two brilliantly recorded compositions (RED SEAL, 29027) Rubenstein's "Staccato Etude" and a Chabrier Scherzo. Over the radio, Stewart, Toronto pianist, Gerald Moore, went to London where he has won renown. He figures justly with the famous violin player, William Primrose, in a noble rendering of Brahms' beautiful Sonata in E Flat Major (MASTERPIECE SET, M-472).

New orchestral releases include the fascinating "Paganini" (RED SEAL, 15169-70) interpreted with vigor, by the London Symphony Orchestra under Stokowski. Vital also with Oriental rhythms is the Beethoven from Arthur Fiedler (RED SEAL, 12319). The Russian mind and mood are revealed in the "Symphony in G Major, played by the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra under Bruno Walter, probably the greatest interpreter of that composer (MASTERPIECE SET, M-472).

Better the death of the young New York genius, George Gershwin, the well known conductor Nathaniel Shilkret presented on the Magic Key broadcast a Memorial Programme, representing every phase of his work, from his early operetta "Forsy and Bess". Of unique interest was a choral setting of "Bluebird" sung by the Victoria Station Group. Other distinguished singers also participated and all numbers were finely recorded by the Victor Company.

The Augustan Choir of New York, conducted by Henry Yeld, is growing in fame, and is a record by Anthony Bonny and expression is Kodaly's "Evening" (RED SEAL, 1937). Britain's army has been much aided by the music of the Victoria Station Group. Other distinguished singers also participated and all numbers were finely recorded by the Victor Company.

**Fire Prevention On The Farm**

In the ten-year period 1928-1937, farm fire losses, exclusive of dwellings, in Canada amounted to over \$38,000,000 in 41,286 fires. Of the known causes, there are eight which are responsible for 85 per cent of the total losses in farm fires. This loss may be greatly reduced by the exercise of care and attention. The eight major causes and suggestions for the elimination of hazards in connection with them are briefly discussed in the following paragraphs:

(1) **DEFECTIVE CHIMNEYS AND FLUES.** Chimneys should be cleaned out regularly and not allowed to burn themselves out, as sparks often escape through cracks in the chimney and set fire in the attic, or they may drop on dry combustible roofing setting fire to it. The safest type of chimney is a good brick chimney built from the ground up and lined with fire clay or vitrified clay of a thickness of at least 3-4 of an inch.

(2) **SPARKS ON COMBUSTIBLE ROOF.** This hazard can be eliminated by means of incombustible roofing material

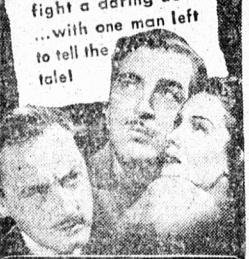

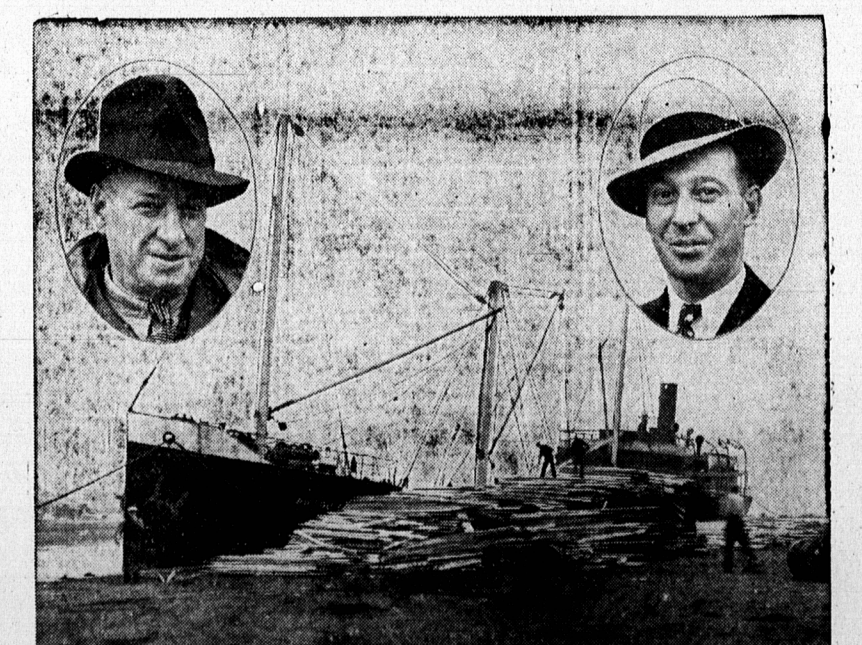

**THE WALKING BIBLE**

**GASOLINE OR KEROSENE**

Gasoline or kerosene should never be used to start or revive a fire. Avoid the use of gasoline, benzine or other inflammable liquids for cleaning floors or clothes. There are safe and cheap solvents on the market for these purposes. Never fill lamps, lanterns, kerosene or gasoline stoves, while they are burning. If necessary to keep small quantities of gasoline, it should be kept in an approved safety can painted red and plainly marked "Gasoline." Small quantities of kerosene should be kept in closed cans of a size and shape different from that holding gasoline in order to lessen the chance of mistaking the one for the other.
