The Markets

MONTREAL, July 7.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was of a very limited character owing to the fact that buyers were not disposed to pay the higher prices asked over night and in consequence business was quiet. The trade in grain on the domestic market was quiet there being little demand from either exporters or local buyers but the feeling in oats was stronger and prices were advanced another 1/2 cent per bushel. Sales of No. 2 Canadian Western were made at 61 1/2 cents. No. 3 C. W. at 56 1/2 cents and Extra No. 1 feed at 57 cents per bushel. There was a considerable improvement in the local and export trade in spring wheat flour and a fair volume of business was done in both cases. The tone of the market was steady. Prices for all lines of mill feed were well maintained with a fair trade passing. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was slow and prices were unchanged. The undertone to the egg market was firm and the volume of business done was fair. Fresh extras were quoted at 327 cents and firsts at 33 cents per dozen. There were no new developments in the potato market business being rather quiet owing to buyers giving

30 Drowned, 4,500 Houses Destroyed

TOKIO, July 7.—Heavy rains in western Japan have drowned thirty persons and destroyed about 4,500 houses. Their attention to new crop offerings, but as supplies of old are small, prices ruled firm. Sales of New Brunswick green mountains white were made at \$2.25 per bag of 90 pounds, in bulk. The market for beans was quiet, but as the offerings were small the undertone was steady and prices were unchanged. Car lots of choice white hand picked were quoted at \$2.25 per bushel, and at \$2.35 to \$2.45 per bushel in smaller quantities. Extreme dullness marked the butter trade but prices were steady. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 33 cents per pound, the receipts were 1,596 packages. The feature of the cheese trade was the stronger feeling that developed and prices were advanced 3/4 cent per pound. This was attributed to the better demand from foreign buyers. Western grades sold at 18 1/2 cents per pound, and eastern grades at 17 1/2 cents per pound, the receipts were 7,864 boxes.

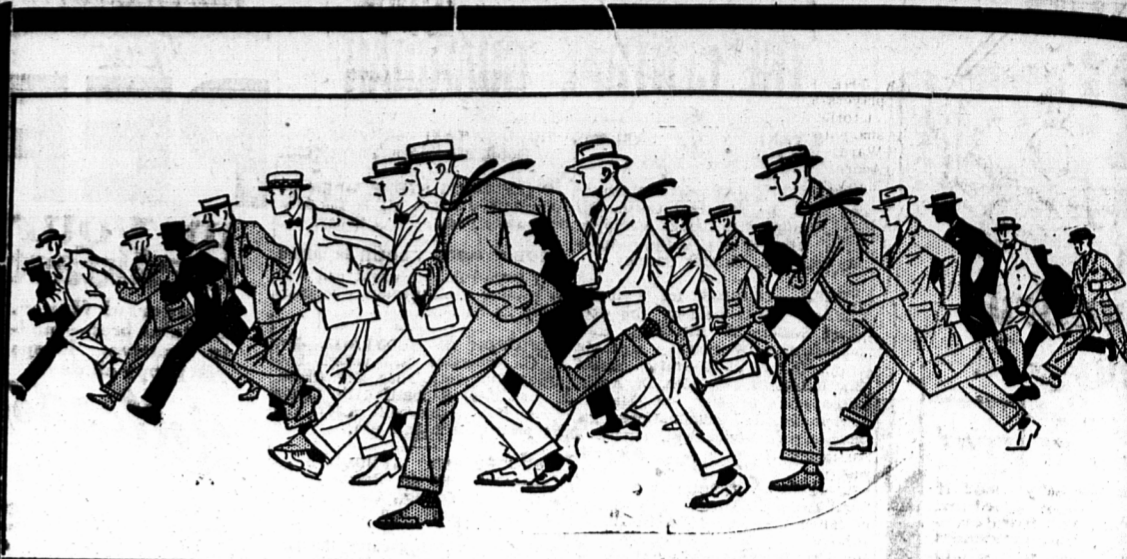
