The September Canadian Magazine contains several features worthy of note. W. J. Thorold writes of the significance of the Coronation from a new viewpoint, and his article is profusely illustrated. The frontispiece of the number gives a splendid idea of the first exclusively colonial review ever held in London. This took place on July 1st. An Oration on Robert Burns, on the occasion of the dedication of a statue in Toronto, by Professor William Clark, is well worth reading. Elsie A. Dent gives an elementary astronomical article for beginners. The charts show how to find the commonest stars. The chief article in the number is an exhaustive history of Lacrosse, with photos of old and new players. This should interest everybody. There is a second illustrated article on "The Queen of Europe"; that on "Carmen Sylva," the Poet-Queen of Roumania is delightful. The best short story in the issue is a Northwest tale from the pen of W. A. Fraser.

TROOPS OF THREE NATIONS SIDE BY SIDE ON REVIEW FIELD.

Historic Event at Ottawa—Canadian, British and American Troops Reviewed by Lord Dundonald in Presence of Twenty-Five Thousand Spectators.

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—His Excellency Lord Minto presided at an event here today, which was both historical and unique in that it included the reviewing of Canadian American and British troops on the same field. The review was one seldom seen for it embodied the troops of three nations, and these in the case of British were from Hong Kong, Northern India and the interior of China. The spectacle on Parliament Hill when the review took place was one of the greatest ever seen in the Capital and was witnessed by over twenty-five thousand people.

At 8 a. m. today the Hong Kong Contingent to the Coronation arrived in the city on their way home and were received at the depot by Mayor Cook, the Aldermen and a deputation of the Militia officers. At eleven o'clock the Hong Kong Regiment, the 10th National Guard of Albany, guests in the city and the G. G. F. G. of Ottawa formed up at the Armouries and marched to Parliament Hill

where they were lined up and at two o'clock noon His Excellency appeared and reviewed them. The Governor General was accompanied by Mayor Maude, Captain Hughes and Col. Vidal.

After carefully inspecting the troops and viewing the trooping of the colors by the Albany corps, His Excellency called the officers of the different corps together and addressing them said that he was exceedingly proud to see the troops of two great nations side by side on the same field and he hoped that if occasion should arise that they would be found in the same position on the field of action. He highly commended their officers on the appearance of their corps and asked that they should carry to the men his appreciation of their behaviour and appearance.

The National Guard and the Hong Kong Contingent were given an excellent entertainment this afternoon and left tonight for Albany and Toronto respectively.

HEIRESS OF AN EARL.

Her Father Fled to America after Marrying A Maid in Earl Perth's Household.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 31.—Carrie and Louise Schnebel, Washington telephone girls, are going to have the time of their lives at the expense of a fellow operator in New York, May Harriet Drummond. She has invited them to go abroad with her, as she is about to sail to take possession of a fortune, with an income of \$225,000, as a result of the death some time ago of the Earl of Perth, one of the wealthiest of the Scottish nobility. The New York and Washington girls struck up a great friendship through working the same wire.

Miss Drummond is the great-grand daughter of the late Earl, her father having been Lord George Essex-Mountier Drummond, who died in Brooklyn 15 years ago. The mother of Miss Drummond was a maid in the household of the Earl of

Perth and was several years older than the young Lord who fell in love with her. When the Earl learned that his grandson was infatuated with the maid he ordered him to be sent to the navy. This did not suit Lord George, who fled to America, after marrying the maid. He got employment as caretaker for a wealthy Brooklyn merchant, whose summer home was at Brook Haven, L. I., and later was a shipping clerk in a wholesale clothing house.

Even after years of separation his grandfather was not satisfied with Lord George's position, and offered him a home in Florida if he would leave his wife, but the young nobleman refused.

By the will of the father Miss May Harriet Drummond was made sole heiress to his interest in the Earl of Perth's estate. Miss Drummond is 22 years of age.

We give as our suggestion foot of Great George street. Mr. Editor, we ask are our people alive? Do we take things as they come or do we make them come? Are we so content ourselves longer with our station at the extreme end of the city when a more central site can be had. Let us not allow a nice building to be erected in a bog, and out of the way, so as to have something to point to as a blunder of the existing Government. Let us be whole souled enough to demand that a nice building be erected, which will be an ornament to the city as well as a convenience to the public.
