THE MANITOBA ELECTIONS.

The provincial election campaign in Manitoba is now in full blast, and is being contested with great vigor on both sides. A number of prominent federal politicians are taking part, foremost among whom on the Conservative side are Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. George B. Foster. The battle is fought pretty strictly on federal party lines, but the gentlemen just named also take a very warm interest in the political fortunes of Hon. Hugh Macdonald for other reasons. The leader of the Manitoba Opposition has been their colleague in the Government at Ottawa, and is besides the only son of the late Sir John A. Macdonald.

Mr. Macdonald himself is a candidate in South Winnipeg, where he is opposing Attorney General Cameron. The latter was elected by acclamation at the provincial election of 1896. This time all the seats throughout the Province, forty in all, are being contested. Prohibition enters to some degree as a factor in the contest. As has been mentioned in these columns Premier Greenway stands pledged, if remaining in power, to carry a prohibition law at the first session of the Legislature, which is called to meet before Christmas. Mr. Macdonald is also willing to go as far in that line as the power of the Province extends, with the important exception that he thinks Winnipeg should be exempted, and the sale of liquor there permitted to continue.

The liquor interest is strong in Winnipeg, as it is in all Canadian cities, and the stand taken by Mr. Macdonald will probably assist him in his own election, but it cannot be satisfactory to the temperance people of the Province. "We have now in Prince Edward Island the same condition of things that he would like to see in Manitoba—the capital under the license system and the traffic rendered illegal in all other parts of the Province. We know how unsatisfactory this is.

The Ontario Department of Education has sent Mr. Bernard McEvoy to make a tour among the technical schools of the United States preparatory to the introduction of manual training in the schools of the Province.

What is to be the form of settlement with the Dutch Republic when our victory is complete has not been as yet very clearly outlined by any one in authority. But it has been intimated that British paramountcy in South Africa will be placed upon a solid basis. Other intimations are that there must be disarmament, and that an indemnity for the war must be paid. It is hoped that a British South African confederation, probably on the Canadian model, will be established before long. But we must first catch the hare, as the cook-books

say, "The war is yet far from being ended."

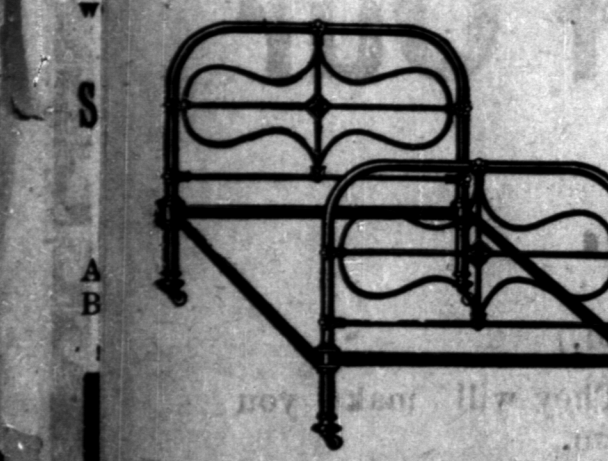
