Red Sox Back To Lead Race In American

NEW YORK, May 6—(AP)—The Red Sox put on a six-run barrage in the fourth inning today at Boston to score an 8-5 triumph over Cleveland Indians and climb back into the leadership of the American Baseball League.

Starting pitcher Willis Hudlin, Jack Humphries and Ken Jungels were the victims of the outburst in which Captain Jimmy Foxx opened the hostilities with a homer. Emerson Dickman started on the mound for the Sox. He weathered a stormy fourth when Cleveland scored twice on a home run and two triples but was taken out in the sixth.

Led by Hank Greenberg and Billy Sullivan, Detroit Tigers pounced on the world champion Yankees at New York again for a 6-4 victory. The defeat was the Yankees' third straight setback and dropped the series into the place. The triumph placed the Tigers only a half game away from second place.

For seven innings Red Ruffing held the Bengas to five hits and one run, homer in the sixth, by Charley Gehring. But in the eighth the Tigers belted him off the mound with three runs on a droust slout by Greenberg and a pinch homer with one on by Sullivan.

Tom Bridges worked the first six innings on the hill for Detroit, yielding all of the Yank's runs, and then gave way for a pinch hitter.

Nelson Potter for Philadelphia and Johnny Rigney for Chicago each yielded nine hits but extra base blows helped the Athletics win 3-2 to even their current three-game series with the White Sox. The victory at Philadelphia gave the Mackmen fifth place.

With Athletics two runs behind, Centerfielder Sam Chapman slammed a homer in the third inning. Philadelphia clinched the game in the sixth.

At Washington, the Senators dropped their fifth straight game, losing to St. Louis Browns 11-9. It was the Browns' second victory of the current series and gave them fourth place.

Big Joe Gallagher put the game on ice for St. Louis when he came up in the eighth with the score tied 9-9 and stragled to score Don Hafner who had singled and gone to second on Bob Swift's sacrifice. The Browns added another tally in the ninth.

The two teams used a total of eight pitchers.

Dodgers Trim Cards 6-2

NEW YORK, May 6—(AP)—These three Brooklyn Dodgers trounced the Cardinals 6-2 today for their 11th victory in 12 starts and shoved St. Louis into a three-way tie for last place in the National Baseball League. The game was at St. Louis.

In winning the Dodgers demonstrated again their ability to come from behind, because the Cards counted both their runs in the first inning and clung doggedly to the lead until the fifth.

Then Roy Cullenbine led off with a single and moved to third on infield out. He scored on a double by Charlie Gilbert, who in turn came in on a two-bagger by Pete Coscarart.

Cullenbine clinched the game in the sixth with a home run after Babe Phelps had singled.

Luke (Hot Potato) Hamlin kept nine hits scattered in winning his second straight game.

Philadelphia Phillies knocked out Dizzy Dean in the fifth inning at Chicago, but all they got for their efforts was an overtime game that Billy Herman hit for the Cubs 5-4 with an 11th-inning homer.

Bunching eight of their 12 hits off Dean in four and two-thirds innings, the Phils inflicted the third straight loss on the Cubs in the 185,000 hurler for a 4-1 lead.

However, while Ken Raffensberger, Charley Root and Larry French hit out any Phils on four hits the remaining six innings, the Cubs closed in by bunching four in the sixth and tied it in the seventh.

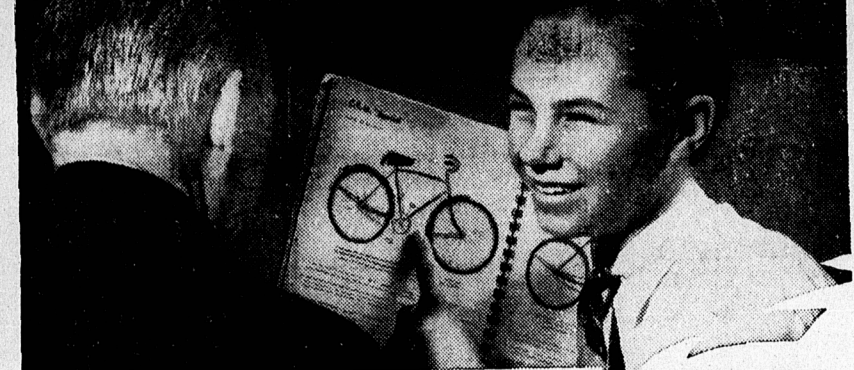

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Newark Bears Down Royals Three Straight

MONTREAL, May 6—(CP)—Newark Bears made it three straight over Montreal Royals today, winning 5-2 to climb over the idle Rochester into sole possession of third place in the International Baseball League.

Continuing their heavy hitting which brought them a double victory yesterday, the Bears cubbed out 11 blows, including four doubles and a triple. Lou Blair set the pace with a single, two-bagger and three-base hit.

Allan Gettel, rookie righthander, had little trouble with the Royals, limiting them to seven scattered hits and holding them scoreless for the first seven innings.

At Toronto, the Maple Leafs lost their fifth straight game and their third in a row to Jersey City Giants 4-1. While Roy Henshaw spaced six hits over four innings, Sid Gordon, center fielder, featured a 10-hit attack on Carl Fischer and Johnny Pezzullo.

Blaemire cracked out a seventh inning home run with Stewart on base while Gordon had a single, double and triple. The only Toronto run was unearned.

Pirates Get Shaken

Manager Frank Frisch gave the Pirates their most drastic shake-up in the memory of Forbes Field veterans, installing some "fight" into the crew but not quite enough to prevent losing their sixth straight game to Boston Bees 10-7 in 12 innings at Pittsburgh.

Six Pirate regulars were benched to start the contest, but before it had ended 24 of the club's 29 men got into the game, setting a new major league record.

With Boston using 16 men, a new record of 40 for two teams also was set. The old mark of 23 used by the team was set by Brooklyn Dodgers in 1937. Yesterday the Dodgers, in their game with St. Louis Cardinals, used 22 players, the total for both teams adding up to 39, to set the record toppled today.

Al Lopez started the winning rally with a double off Oadis Swigart.

Cincinnati, the Reds staged a seven-run spree in the sixth inning to overwhelm New York Giants 9-1 on the five-hit hurling of Gene (Jumbo) Thompson.

The game marked the debut of Paul Dean, who pitched two scoreless innings in relief for the Giants. The one-time St. Louis Cardinal hero had an easy seventh inning after supplanting Harry Gumbert, but the Reds got two singles in the eighth.

Gumbert was the victim of all the Cincinnati scoring. He went to pieces in the sixth during a five-hit bombardment climaxed by Harry Craft's three-run homer.
