Haymaking

(By J. A. Clark, D.Sc., Superintendent, Experimental Station, Charlottetown, P. E. I.) This article will mention three suggestions in making hay. First: Early cutting of clover and areas of perennial weeds such as Ox-eye daisy, yellow and hawk-weeds.

Use of Tripods The following gives a very brief outline of a method of curing hay on tripods or Finn poles during unfavorable weather. No doubt many are familiar with the use of tripods. Each tripod consists of three poles having holes bored six inches from the top and are wired together with No. 9 wire so that the poles will fold up and down for storage.

The Finn Pole The Finn poles originated in Finland where they are used in damp moist weather conditions. The Finn pole is eight feet long with two cross pieces two feet long that are bolted to the top and bottom handles. They are inserted in one inch holes in the poles. These poles are bolted to the top, should be sharpened at both ends. The poles are set eighteen inches in the ground in a row with not over six inches between them.

Justice McGuigan Takes Oath of Office In Supreme Court



JUSTICE MCGUIGAN

A special sitting of the Supreme Court was held yesterday morning for the purpose of having Mr. Justice M. R. McGuigan sworn in as a Judge of the Supreme Court and as a member of the Court of Chancery.

The oath was administered by Mr. Justice MacGuigan's commission, after which Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell addressed himself to congratulatory remarks regarding Mr. McGuigan's appointment, especially mentioning his own association with Mr. McGuigan during a period of eight years in an executive capacity in connection with the administration of public affairs.

He was followed by Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, who also expressed himself very cordially regarding Mr. McGuigan and his qualifications.

Mr. Heath Strong, K.C., of Summerside, president of the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, then addressed the Court and read the following prepared address:

Address From Law Society "To the Honourable Mark Rudolph MacGuigan, Master of the Rolls of the Court of Chancery and Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Judicature."

"The members of the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, comprising the whole legal profession of the Province, view with great satisfaction your appointment to the Bench.

"Your record in the profession and in public life gives us an assured confidence that you will discharge your new duties impartially and conscientiously.

"Our members recall with pleasure and appreciation your valuable contribution of effective efficiency to the Province for some years of the Executive of our Society, and we extend our best wishes to you in the discharge of your duties in the honourable office to which you have been called.

"Your Lordship has received a call to the Bench at a time of great difficulty in the world's history.

"In view of the present stress and of possible impending changes, it may perhaps be fitting that we take this opportunity to express the most earnest intention and resolve on the part of the legal profession to give every co-operation and assistance to the Court and to all good citizens in the initiation and enactment as well as in the administration of any and every law which may ameliorate present conditions and advance the welfare and happiness of our Province."

Respectfully submitted on behalf of the Law Society. (Signed) "Heath Strong, President, "J. Arthur McGuigan, Vice-President, "W. E. Bentley, Secretary-Treasurer."

Hon. F. A. Large, Attorney General, then addressed complimentary remarks to Mr. McGuigan. He said: "May it please your Lordships: "I wish to associate myself with my Lord the Chief Justice, and with the Law Society of the Province, in extending my congratulations and felicitations to Mr. Justice MacGuigan upon his elevation to the Bench of the Supreme Court and to the position of Master of the Rolls of the Court of Chancery.

With his Lordship, Mr. Justice MacGuigan, I have received a call to high service in the administration of the legal affairs of the Province, a call of very great stress and difficulty. "I join with the members of the Law Society and with all your Lordships in expressing a similar intention and resolve in every way to give my fullest co-operation and assistance to your Lordships, to the Government of the Province, and to the public generally, in the promotion of every form of legislation and enactment and in the administration of all laws which will bring about a betterment of the conditions of our people. "It is my desire and intention, cordially and up to the measure of my ability, to play my part, with your Lordships, in bringing about and in giving an honest and efficient enforcement of the law, to the end that justice may be administered under the law maintained and upheld throughout the length and breadth of the Province.

"In seeking this aim, and in the performance of my new duties, I know I shall have your Lordships' fullest support, and may I ask that I may also have the sympathetic support, not only of your Lordships, but of every member of the public."
