A [FURTHER PREFERENCE.

The important announcement is made by Hon. Mr. Fielding in his budget speech that on and after 1st July next the preferential tariff in favor of the United Kingdom will be made thirty-three and one third per cent in place of twenty-five per cent as at present. In this way the duties on British goods after the date named will be one third less than the duties on goods imported from foreign countries.

When the departure was made some years ago of admitting British goods to Canada at a slightly lower rate of duty than foreign goods, THE GUARDIAN expressed its hearty endorsement of that action, and also of the promise, since carried into effect, of extending the preference at a later date to twenty-five per cent. Since that time any objections at first expressed against the preferential tariff have died out, and the principle stands to-day approved by the great majority of the Canadian people. The further change now announced comes at a time when Canadian loyalty and affection for the Mother Country are at flood tide, and there is little doubt that it will be favorably received. The favorable state of the Dominion revenues makes it easy for the Finance Minister to carry his loyal purpose into effect. To the large surplus of the past year there is every promise that the current year will add another surplus equally large. Canadian trade has in recent years expanded by leaps and bounds and the time is most auspicious in every way for further nurturing our import trade in a quarter where we find a market for the great bulk of the products we have to sell beyond the sea.

President Kruger is said to be ignorant enough to believe that the earth is flat. He knows very well that the mass of his Dutch subjects are still more ignorant than himself. His piety is not of the sort that gives him any qualms of conscience in deceiving those who trust him. Hence it comes that he has invented and proclaimed the monumental lie that the Russians have occupied London. It may console the benighted burghers for the occupation of Bloemfontein by Lord Roberts to learn that the British metropolis is occupied by an invading army.

Some years ago under the title of The Battle of Dorking a pamphlet was published in England which led to a great deal of discussion. It pictured the invasion and conquest of Britain as something which might occur, and was the means of creating a strong public sentiment in favor of more extensive and thorough measures for home defence. In the olden time Britain was many times invaded, but since having obtained the supremacy of the sea it has not been found practicable to carry an invading army from the Continent across the British Channel. Napoleon contemplated making the attempt, but contented himself with holding a large army in readiness on the other side. A French dreamer has resumed the discussion in a sensational brochure of which we elsewhere print a synopsis. No one in the British Empire will probably lose any sleep on account of reading it.

We have received the calendar of the Summer School of Science for the current year, containing the list of members, the financial statement for last year, a brief account of last summer's meeting at Campbellton, N. B. the courses of study to be pursued at next meeting, &c. The School will meet at Bear River, N. S. on 26th July next and continue to 10th August. Bear River is a picturesque village of about 1200 inhabitants, situated about three miles and a half from Annapolis Basin. The calendar is illustrated with cuts showing groups of last year's members and those of 1898 with back-grounds of securing the places visited. We fail to see much utility in the controversy as to the respective merits of the winter steamers Stanley and Minto. No one doubts that the Stanley has been a splendid winter boat, and that even after the hard battles she has fought she is yet capable of rendering good service. The people of the Island felt that an additional winter boat was needed of greater engine power than the Stanley. The press and the Board of Trade recommended that a new boat be procured and Sir Louis Davies very promptly responded to the demand and procured the Minto for us. The consensus of opinion among those who have travelled by the new steamer appears to be that she is an excellent boat, well adapted in every way for the service she is called upon to perform. We believe that the general public fully appreciate her value. The slurs and insinuations against the Minto appear to be conceived in a very narrow spirit. We commend to our readers the letter of Mr. F. W. Hyndman, which appears in another column over his signature. He speaks from experience and personal knowledge of these matters, and in a sensible, moderate way.

THE regular meeting of the Charlottetown Teacher's Association was held on Saturday evening in the Y. M. C. A. Parlor, President Landrigan presiding. In a few well chosen remarks he introduced His Honor Judge Warburton who read a very interesting and suggestive paper on stages in the Progress of the British Empire. He confined himself entirely to the history of the present century of which he made three divisions as follows: 1st. The period of the struggle for National Existence against outside powers; 2nd. The period of Internal reform when the power passed out of the hands of the oligarchy and the democracy ruled. 3rd. The period of imperial unity so manifest at the present when every part of the Empire stands shoulder to shoulder in the struggle which now prevails and which is hastening the Empire on to its manifest destiny, Imperial Federation. Several present expressed their appreciation of the paper and on motion of Messrs. Seaman and Owen, the hearty thanks of the meeting were tendered the lecturer who responded in fitting terms. The next meeting of the Association will be held on Saturday, April 7th, when Mr. McCready, Editor of THE GUARDIAN will read a paper on the South African War.
