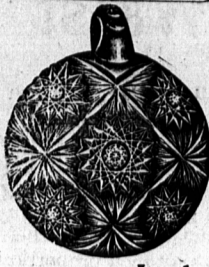

The str. Alexandria, belonging to the N. B. Snowball Co., of Chatham in tow of the tug St. Nicholas put into Summerside last night for shelter. The Alexandria lost her rudder some days ago, and is being towed to Pictou where a new rudder and a general overhauling will be given her.

At the third monthly meeting of poultry men of P. E. Island Tuesday night there was a fair attendance. The Association's poultry show prize list was started but owing to too small attendance it was left until the next meeting. A special meeting is to take place next Tuesday evening at 7.30, up stairs in the Prince of Wales College. Every member should attend as the work cannot be done on with without a large attendance.

The D. G. S. Gullane sailed from this port at noon yesterday for Pictou to take on board Dr. W. Bell Dawson, who is in charge of the tidal survey work which will be carried on this year in the Lower St. Lawrence and Northumberland Strait. Dr. Dawson will be assisted by Sydney C. Hyndman, who recently arrived from Ottawa and who was engaged last year in putting down tide gauges along the Pacific Coast, in British Columbia.

Just about the witching hour of midnight, last night, the method of call on the Charlottetown telephone system was changed from the old style of ringing a bell to the new silent plan which will prevail in future and possesses so many advantages over the old system that it is needless to say further. The last old style call was rung out by a message for Dr. Jenkins, and the first new call was made by the Guardian "just as the clock struck twelve," last night. The most important social event for some time in Charlottetown took place yesterday afternoon when at the home of her mother, Mrs. A. A. Alley, the marriage of Miss Winnie Brecken to John O. The bride is a daughter of the late Joseph Brecken, and the groom is a son of F. W. Hyndman and with his father is associated in the business of Hyndman & Co. The bride's step father, A. A. Alley gave her away. The bridesmaids were Miss Edith Hyndman, the groom's sister; and Miss Constance Fitzgerald. John R. Davies was groomsmen. The bride wore white satin, and her bouquet was of roses, lilies of the valley and maiden hair fern. Lobsters were worth \$16 per case last year but have come down this year on account of the financial depression which has reduced the demand for all luxuries, including the lobster.
