PLAYING THE GAME.

The world loves a manly player, one who stands by the rules of the game, plays it honestly—win or lose—and takes his defeat or his victory as the natural consequence of the energy he displayed and the forces arrayed against him.

For the man who wins unfairly, who cheats in order to win, who sneaks behind the referee to take advantage, the world has only contempt. He may win the game, he may secure the coveted medal, he may even be greeted with the plaudits of those who look upon the winning as the chief end of the game, and there are such, but the winning and the medal and the plaudits will not remove the stigma of dishonesty.

Life, in some respects at least, is a game. Some are playing it for a living, some for the medal and the joy of winning and some for the pleasure of playing. Whatever the ultimate object may be the rules of the game are the same. And it is well to abide by the rules. Society has agreed to confine its appetites and its ambitions within certain limits. These are the rules of the game. They are as brittle as are the rules of the hockey club and as frequently broken but in every case the penalty is the same. The medal may be won, the plaudits may resound, but the stigma of dishonesty will not fade away.

By too many the winning of the game is too strongly emphasized and the manner of the playing too lightly regarded. A multi-millionaire who was looked upon as one of the greatest financial successes of his age ad-

mitted that in order to make his millions he had found it necessary to ruin practically every man with whom he did business. He won the medal, the millions, many of them, but to the thousands whom he ruined or injured his name will be a theme. And as the game comes to an end and he looks backward over the manner of it he will have little reason to bless the means by which he won. The joy of the winning, however fascinating while the game was on, will have lost its brightness for him. He played "for the sake of a ribboned coat or the selfish hope of a season's fame." The coat is now threadbare and shabby and the season's fame forgotten.

And some play for the pleasure of playing, for the rollicking good time of the present. Here too the rules of the game are broken. Health, mental and physical development are sacrificed, the future is mortgaged for present pleasure. It is not playing the game. It is throwing away life and at the end of the game the "ribboned coat" and the "season's fame" look ghastly in the presence of death or poverty or both.

He who violates for his personal advantage the laws within which his fellows have consented to live and do business, or who for the sake of a merry time sacrifices health or home or school—is not playing the game.

It is not for the sake of a ribboned coat, or the selfish hope of a season's fame; But his captain's hand on his shoulder smote—"Play up, play up, and play the game."

COMING THIS WAY

It will be difficult to find fault, politically or otherwise, with the appropriations made for Prince Edward Island in the estimates submitted in parliament last week. That throughout Canada, as a whole, a period of expansion is opening up cannot be questioned for a moment. That the government is placing itself and the country in line with the growing time and making ample provision for growth is clearly evident.

department especially, expanded until the wilderness prairie is dotted with cities and magnificent farming sections.

And now the East, the old East, with its established and in some cases almost decadent enterprises, is coming into its own. Adequate appropriations are being made for development and it is not too much to expect that the response will be even more pronounced than in the new and wilderness west. We have harbors open the year round, we have unlimited resources in coal, iron, oil, lumber, agriculture, fisheries, resources tried and proved and on a solid foundation. Development is all that is needed and the appropriations made this week for this development cannot but inaugurate a period of growth such as neither the east nor the west has yet seen.

What does all this mean to Prince Edward Island? By means of the car ferry, now building, we are becoming part of the East. Heretofore we stood alone, an island in the midst of a sea inaccessible for three and four months continuously, a detached and unrecognized bit of the fringe of the dominion. Now we are to be on the map, on the main line of the transcontinental railway, with direct, unbroken-car-connection with every point from the Atlantic to the Pacific. What should it mean for us?

Prince Edward Island, in its new connection, is not an experiment. With absolutely nothing but its own natural resources, with practically little assistance from its parent government, with the same petitions for its legitimate rights repeated in vain year after year since we entered confederation, the province, notwithstanding these disadvantages, has become the wealthiest, per capita, in the dominion. What can it not do under the changed conditions?

We care not what the political name of the party is that has recognized the long neglected rights of the province. The thing is that these rights are being recognized and adjusted and that under the new order of things there is hope for greater forward strides than we have yet known.

We have not yet learned the possibilities of an acre of its soil but we are learning that these possibilities are almost infinite. This, for all time to come, will be an unfailing source of wealth. The appropriations for the extension of agriculture are sufficiently generous to make incalculable development along this line. Our fisheries which have been neglected and even depleted are being restored and they too will develop under the improved conditions because they are the finest of their kind in the world.

NOTES.

It will be noted by the incomplete summary in our despatches of the 3rd, that Prince Edward Island has been generously treated in the estimates. The amount appropriated for the year's work will set the ball rolling healthily and there is more to follow. The appropriation for the standardizing of the railway and for the car ferry terminus is merely preliminary and as a starter. It is sufficiently large to justify all the hopes of those who have been anticipating a boom in the province and it requires little optimism to foresee a period of expansion and growth in the immediate future such as the province has never before experienced. This is Prince Edward Island's growing time and it behooves every man in it to place himself in shape for what is coming. This is the time to sink all party distinctions and rivalries and to pull together. The province is bigger than any party and the party in charge is showing itself equal to the job.

Her confession resulted in orders being issued to allow no women within the grounds at Buckingham Palace, save those known to be anti-suffragists.

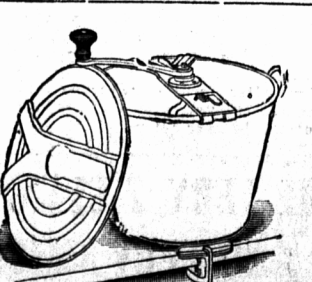
