GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Of Presbyterian Church of Canada

THE OPENING SESSION

No Assembly in History of Church With so Many Commissioners.

Ottawa, June 13.—The first General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for the twentieth century was opened under auspicious circumstances last evening in St. Andrew's Church, which was filled from platform to rear. It was stated on the way to the opening by a member of the committee of arrangements that at no Assembly in the history of the Church had so many commissioners registered for the inauguration proceedings.

Principal Pollock, of the Theological Seminary at Halifax, was in the pulpit punctually at 8 o'clock. A full choir was in the choir gallery.
The proceedings began with the singing of 'O God of Bethel, by whose hands thy people still are fed,' etc. The Principal read the second psalm and the third of John from verse twenty-five, prayer followed, accompanied by 'Praise the Lord' and 'Amen,' now and then from a person in the audience. An anthem by the choir was followed by prayer and singing, after which the retiring moderator preached from John xiii. 17: 'If ye know these things happy are ye if ye do them.' The sermon was appropriate, lengthy, comprehensive, touching things exegetically, historically, practically, doctrinally, presbyterially. After the hymn 'Behold, the mountain of the Lord in latter day shall rise,' the moderator and clerks took their places on the platform in front of the pulpit and the formal constitution of the General Assembly took place. According to a practice which has obtained for three or four years, the calling of the roll was dispensed with on recommendation of the business committee and the retiring moderator proceeded with his farewell, in the course of which he alluded to the Assembly of 1900, to the unique features of a new century gathering, to the distinction accorded to him of having the last word from the chair for the old century and the first word from the new, to the losses of the Queen, and the veteran missionary, Dr. MacKay of Formosa, to the hopefulness attaching to the Empire by the accession of the new King to the throne, to the adoption of the course taken by the Presbyterian Church in Canada, by the Presbyterian Church in Scotland and Australia in the matter of union and to other matters that fitted in well in a retiring address.
When the retiring moderator asked for nominations for the successorship there was but one name presented. Professor Bryce, of Winnipeg, and Dr. Armstrong of Ottawa, proposed the Rev. Dr. Warden. The Assembly signified its acceptance of the name immediately and in a few moments accompanied by his mover and seconder the new moderator appeared in the chair returning thanks, and delivered a short inaugural address.
On motion of Messrs. Walter Paul of Montreal, and Dr. Murray, of Kincardine the thanks of the assembly were formally tendered the retiring moderator for his conduct in the chair during the year and for the opening sermon. Dr. Pollock made fitting response and took occasion to and intimate to the court that responses to the loyal addresses from the assembly of 1900 to her late Majesty and to the Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada were received by him.
It was further reported by the Rev. Messrs. Andrew Robertson and Thomas Fowler that they had discharged the duties the assembly of last year had entrusted to them of being present in Scotland to represent the Presbyterian Church in Canada on the occasion of the union between the Free Church and the United Presbyterian Church.
After certain items of routine had been

arranged, and an invitation accepted for a garden party on Friday on the spacious grounds belonging to the Ladies' College, the opening sederunt of the assembly of 1901 was closed at half-past ten o'clock.

THIS MORNING'S PROCEEDINGS.

This first hour of this morning's sederunt was given to devotional exercises. The Ministerial Association of Ottawa sent to the Assembly this morning a cordial salutation composed of ministers from all Protestant denominations. The association said it was willing to place itself for the time being in the hands of the General Assembly, to accept its polity, to have its members occupy all pulpits, and to do what lay in the power of the members to make the first assembly of the century a great success and blessing. Speaking of Ottawa as the political capital, the association referred to the state parliament as just concluded, and to the great parliament of Presbyterianism which was just begun.

A good portion of the short sederunt was spent in receiving applications from ministers belonging to other churches, and students asking for special privileges. Many documents were read in this connection, to which were sent with relative papers to a committee that will give them careful consideration and report upon them at a later sederunt.

A committee was appointed, with Dr. Herridge, the pastor of the church, as convener, to arrange for the Sabbath services on the Assembly Sunday.

The Rev. J. W. MacMillan, of Lindsay, who recently declined the call from Fort Massey Church, Halifax, was appointed to assist Dr. Campbell, the clerk, in the duties at the clerk's table during the occupancy of the chair by the present moderator.

THE NEW MODERATOR.

It was generally expected that the Rev. Dr. Warden would succeed Principal Pollock in the moderatorship. No other name was proposed, and the election of the new moderator this year took up less time than is usual with this eventful portion of the opening of a General Assembly.

The Rev. Dr. Warden was ordained into the ministry in the year 1868, and continued in pastoral work for nine years in Petrolia and western Ontario, when he went to Montreal to assume the financial agency of the Presbyterian College in that city. He remained in Montreal in agency work until after the death of the Rev. Dr. Reid, of Toronto, who for many years was agent of the church, Dr. Warden, by call and appointment, became Dr. Reid's successor and removed to Toronto. The new moderator also shares in the clerkship of the General Assembly with the Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal. He excels in the financial departments of the church's operations. He is convener of the committee on the century fund movement, and took occasion last evening in addressing the Assembly, after having been chosen to be moderator to state that the expected four hundred thousand dollars, which was the debt portion of the million dollar scheme, was raised and doubled. He stated that four hundred thousand of the six hundred thousand belonging to the common fund, or second portion of the scheme, has actually paid in at the present time; that the remaining two hundred thousand was an assurance, and that there was cause for general rejoicing that instead of the round million which was aimed at for June, 1901, it had become swelled to one million four hundred thousand dollars.
