It was reported that the sale of the Christmas number of the Society's Cook Book was being pushed and was making gratifying progress.

**INTERESTING MEETING.**—The W. M. S. of Grace Church held their quarterly prayer-meeting last evening at the home of Mrs. W. S. Newson, president of the Auxiliaries, presiding. The Scripture lesson was taken by Mrs. (Rev.) E. Bell. A very interesting paper, gleanings from the study-book—"Western women in eastern lands"—was given by Mrs. Gough. A trio was sweetly sung by Misses Carter, Whitlock and Wayne. Rev. Mr. Marshall gave a short and interesting address on the Missionary problems in Western Canada.

**FOR CONVENIENCE OF SHOPPERS.**—For the purpose of affording people living along the Murray Harbor line of the railway an exceptional opportunity of coming in to Charlottetown for their Christmas shopping, arrangements were made yesterday with the authorities of the P. E. I. railway whereby special trains will be run on the Murray Harbor branch on Thursday, 18th, and Monday, 22nd December. Special rates will be given for these trains, and thus an attractive opportunity of getting to the city from that part of the country and back is provided. The trains will leave Murray Harbor at 7.30 o'clock in the morning and Charlottetown at five o'clock in the evening, affording ample and convenient period for shopping.

**FOX MEETING.**—The annual meeting of the Riverside Farming Co., Ltd., "Pryon," P. E. I., was held at the Ranch on the first Tuesday in December, nearly all the shareholders being present. 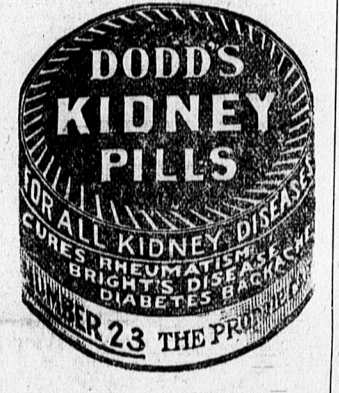

The church supports two missionary families, one in Bolivia, South America, and one in India, besides contributing liberally to the foreign and home mission funds. Mr. MacLean will be missed in the city, especially by those who were members of his congregation. He is a native of Prince Edward Island, a graduate of Acadia university, and a post graduate of Chicago university. Before coming to Calgary Mr. MacLean was pastor of a church in Portage-La-Prairie, Manitoba. The congregation of Olivet Baptist church has not as yet had an opportunity to choose a successor to Mr. MacLean, but steps will be taken immediately to secure a new pastor. Mr. MacLean is a brother of Mr. D. J. MacLean, of Montague, and uncle of Miss Kathleen Dockendorf of Charlottetown.

**GOOD YEAR.**—The Kensington Dairying Association is now issuing its annual report for the past year, which has been a very successful year in many respects. The total number of pounds of milk supplied was 3,341,305, an increase of 45,140 lbs over 1912, and netting the patrons about \$1.00 per hundred lbs., a little lower than last year (\$1.01). This fact being accounted for by a decrease in the average price of cheese and an increase in the average price of hauling. One patron, Mr. Joseph Dawson supplied 41,058 lbs milk for which he received \$410. Another patron, Mr. H. R. Baker, with one cow, after supplying three families with milk, supplied the factory with 5879 lbs for which he received \$58.79.

**MOVING PICTURES.**—The moving picture men, Mr. R. Cleveland and his assistants were yesterday busily engaged in taking photographs in Charlottetown. Governor Rogers, Premier Mathieson, and Mr. W. Frost, U. S. Consul, were photographed in their respective offices. The Premier and members of the government, provincial officials and others, were also photographed on the steps of the Provincial Building.
