The City of Charlottetown Match to which the City contributes \$100.00 will be shot at 500 and 600 yards. Winner of the first prize receives \$15.00 and the Alfred Pickard cup. In addition to the regular prizes it also has prizes for Tyros and service rifle shots the same as the other matches.

The Jones Memorial Match — This match is in memory of Pilot Officer Arthur M. Jones, son of Major J. M. Jones, Charlottetown, P.E.I., who was killed while on a bombing mission over Vaukeka, Germany, and is buried north of Dusseldorf, Germany. Major J. M. Jones contributes \$100.00 to this match and is transferring 100 shares of International Nickel Common, to the Association to maintain the interest on these shares, this match in perpetuity. It will be shot at the 200, 500 and 600 yards, seven shots at each distance. First and second prizes will consist of the Jones Memorial gold and silver medals with \$20.00 added for first and \$15.00 for second, and a very generous supporting prize list.

In connection with the Jones Memorial Match there will be the Henderson & Cudmore Tyro Match, in which this firm contributes \$25.00 and the balance is set apart by the Association as a special match for Tyros. There will also be the usual prizes for service rifle shots in connection with the Jones Memorial and Henderson & Cudmore Matches. The British Consols Team Match—The W. C. Macdonald, Inc. of Montreal contribute the sum of \$25.00 for the above match. Teams of three from any militia unit or any Rifle Association are eligible. The teams making the highest scores in the Moore & McLeod and City of Charlottetown Matches being the winners. The Nicholson Tyro Aggregate — The winner receives \$100 presented by the Hickey & Nicholson

Tobacco Co. second prize is either the daily Guardian or daily Patriot and the balance of the Prize List is made up by the Association. This aggregate is only open to Tyros in the competitions shot previously.

The Grand Aggregate — This is aggregate of the matches mentioned above and the riflemen scoring the greatest number of points will receive the Governor General's silver medal and the riflemen making the second highest number of points the Governor General's bronze medal.

The Ottawa Aggregate — Prize winners in this aggregate are the 27 riflemen whose scores are the highest in all the matches shot during the meeting. Top shot receives the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association medal and \$5.00 and the next highest scorer the Dominion of Canada medal and \$4.00. In addition there are prizes for the remaining riflemen.

The Ottawa Rifle Team — The Prince Edward Island Provincial Government contributes \$100.00 towards the expenses of sending a team of riflemen to represent the Province at the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association matches in August. This Association adds to the above amount up to fifteen men.

The MacKinnon Cup — This cup is presented by Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, President of the Association, to the winner of the Ottawa Aggregate.

Mr. J. W. Johnston, optometrist of Charlottetown, donates a silver trophy for the highest aggregate made by competitors in the DeBlais Bros., Moore & McLeod and City of Charlottetown matches. In addition there are company challenge cups of No. 2 and No. 8 Batteries, Heavy Brigade, open for competition to members of the artillery.

With the above generous Prize List of which only a brief resume has been given, there should be a large turnout of riflemen to practices, which will be held regularly from this date. Workmen are getting the range in shape and everything necessary for the matches will be procured for the opening. There are some wonderful rifle shots in this Province who had training during the recent war and there are available a large number of first class service rifles. These can be shot as issued for special prize list in each match or can be equipped with Parker, Hale or a new sight recently issued. In any event there is nothing to prevent a good rifleman from taking away his fair share of the large number of prizes.

In the recent practices for the Inter-Maritime trophy service rifles taken right out of the box were shipped from Halifax rung up scores of 101 - 99 - 98 - 97 and several 96's over the same range the matches will take place on, and Lt. R. E. Jenkins scored 99, which was the highest score of the three teams, with a service rifle at Halifax.

Carrying funeral wreaths, boys in white uniforms shown here, led the solemn procession down the main street of the gold mining town of Malartic as the bodies of eight miners were borne to the church for last rites. The miners were the victims of the April 24 disaster, that took 13 lives. Three were buried elsewhere.



Rearsees for a day, two draped municipal trucks, each bearing four caskets, are seen in the funeral procession at Malartic, followed by line of mourners' cars. Service was brief and simple, as a public funeral mass was said jointly for all a week ago. A 12th man, who died after meeting the surface was buried two months ago.
