HINTS FOR The Motorist

THE MUFFLER OR SILENCER

The instant the exhaust valve opens during the latter part of the power stroke, the intensely heated gases at a pressure of upward of 75 pounds per square inch escape explosively and, if they were allowed to pass directly from the cylinder into the open air, would make a noise like the report of a gun. If, on the other hand, these gases were let into an extremely small chamber, closed, except for a single small outlet to the air, each explosion would raise the pressure therein but very slightly and the escape through the outlet would be at low pressure, gentle and almost noiseless. Moreover, the walls of such a large chamber would rapidly radiate and conduct away the heat of the entering gases, causing the contraction and reducing their pressure. From such a large chamber the final escape of the gases to the air would be sudden and explosive rather than time sufficiently free so that the piston, in making its exhaust stroke, would not have to push the gases out against any appreciable resistance.



practice has objections. Many mufflers are not built with concentric chambers, but with perforated, dividing the cylinder into a number of compartments, through which the gases pass successively. In another type of muffler, the velocity of a part of the escaping gases is utilized to create a suction in the chamber, which causes the rest of the gas to be drawn into the outer air. In all cases, the object sought is the reduction of the pressure of final escape, with a minimum of resistance to gas flow. pipe not shown. E, F and G are cylindrical shells of sheet iron, fitted tightly at their ends into circular projections formed in the casings B and C, so as to form three concentric chambers H, J and K, the two former being of annular and the last named of cylindrical section. In the shell F, near its end furthest from the gas entrance, is a series of small holes extending completely around it, permitting the somewhat restricted passage of gasses from chamber H to chamber J and in shell G, at the opposite end, is a similar series of holes connecting chamber J and K. After leaving the exhaust manifold, the intensely heated gases, pass through the exhaust pipe, where they are somewhat cooled and contracted, enter the muffler and pass between the walls BB into chamber H which is of large volume and, being exposed to the air, causes their cooling, their contraction and a large pressure reduction. The gases then escape somewhat gradually through the holes in shell F into chamber J, where they are further expanded, with a resulting loss in pressure, and travel through J to its opposite end, where they flow through the holes in shell G into chamber K and sustain a still further reduction in pressure. They then travel the length of K and escape through the perforations in the walls BB, pressure so slight as to be quite without the outside air without objectionable noise. Very often, on account of constructional considerations, the gases are first led into the central chamber and expand through the middle and outer air, escaping through numerous small holes in its shell, but this

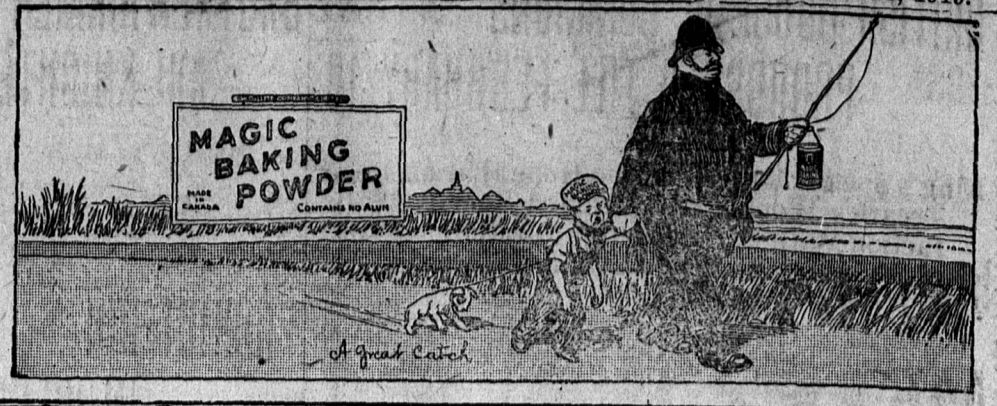
