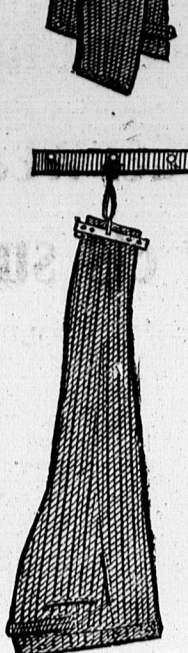

TROOPS PROTECT THE VATICAN FROM MOB

ROME, Oct 18—Over 200,000 persons attended a mass meeting today, in the Piazza di Campo to protest against the death of Prof. Francisco Ferrer, the noted Spanish anarchist, at Barcelona. Those present were mostly laborers and shopkeepers, with a large proportion of the dregs of the population, the unemployed, discontented and hooligans, besides Socialists and Anarchists. Violent speeches violent to Spain and the Vatican were made, and these were greeted with groans and cries of "Down with Spain," "Death to the Pope," and "Death to Merry Del Val." The harangue lasted for over an hour and then they were interrupted by the sight of a dirigible balloon which unexpectedly appeared making circles over the meeting place.

The police had taken precautions to guard against disorders and troops were concealed at convenient places where their services could be quickly called upon. The meeting ended calmly, but when the mob attempted to cross the bridges cavalry blocked their way, while infantry were lined eight deep along the street at the corners leading to the two Spanish Embassies and the Vatican. When the mob saw these preparations they hesitated for a while and then attempted to rush the lines. They were checked by the infantry with fixed bayonets, while the cavalry delivered charges. Each charge was preceded by a warning bugle call, which created a panic among the crowd and roused a stampede.

A portion of the demonstrators succeeded, however, in reaching the centre of the city through side streets. They occasionally penetrated the military cordon and started running towards the Palazzo di Spagna, where the Spanish Embassy and the Vatican are located. The embassy building was surrounded by troops eight deep, and the mob's attempt to reach it were fruitless. The police used their fists freely, and the soldiers charged, repulsing the attacks.

The mob made similar efforts to reach the Vatican but they were frustrated in a like manner. Stones were thrown at the cavalry. A few shop windows were broken. The troops are still holding their positions, but the danger of conflicts is considered to be past.

OPPOSED TO THE NAVAL PROGRAM

OTTAWA, October 1—Hon. N. A. Belcourt, formerly a member of the house for Ottawa recently called to the senate by the Dominion government, delivered an address last evening in which he severely criticised the growing spirit of militarism in Canada as evidenced by the naval program of the Laurier government. Senator Belcourt is a French-Canadian, but aspires to succeed Sir Wilfrid Laurier as Premier of Ottawa. Mr. Lemieux, a brother of the postmaster general and a bitter contest is anticipated. Should he be nominated it is not unlikely that the Belcourt faction may run an independent liberal candidate upon a platform which will take issue with the present program for Canadian naval defense.

ALL CANADIAN GRAVES ARE MARKED

(London Oct 18)
All the graves of Canadians who fell in the South African war have been suitably marked, and the South African Memorial Association which was organized for this purpose in making this announcement, ceases to exist. In its final report the association states that it collected \$14,269 for the purpose of locating and marking the graves of fallen Canadians. There were 246 Canadian victims of the South African war, 240 being buried in Africa, 11 at sea, and 6 in England.

A hundred and eighty stones were erected, some at Paardeberg and Haart's River being of large dimensions to indicate the resting place of many soldiers that at Paardeberg bearing 17 names. Each grave has been photographed, and copies sent to the next of kin. All the graves have been marked with coping stones, guarded by substantial iron railings, and at Paardeberg and Haart's River trees have been planted around the cemeteries. After all expenses had been met there remained a balance of \$4,967, which was handed over to the Royal Women's Guild of South Africa, which has undertaken to care for the graves.

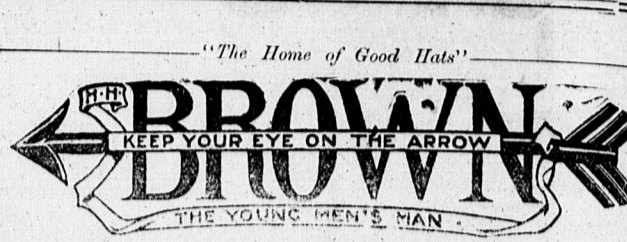

The BUILDERS' EXCHANGE WILL RUN OPEN SHOP. MONTREAL, Oct. 17—Some time ago the stonemasons and bricklayers unions sent a notice to the builders exchange that after Oct. 15th no stonemason would be allowed to lay a stone on a building on which the brick had been laid by non-union bricklayers and no bricklayer would be allowed to lay brick on buildings employed. Today the builders exchange sent a reply saying that they sent a reply saying that they had been running an open shop and intended continuing to do so. No discrimination would be shown against union men but the employers reserved the right of employing whom they liked, irrespective of the orders of any one else. A meeting of the stonemasons union was called for this evening but the attendance was so poor that it was abandoned. Whether a strike will be called tomorrow or not remains to be seen.
