MR. MORGAN'S POWER.

Sentiment is completely reversed. A fortnight ago people were conjuring panics. Today they talk only of booms. Brokerage officers two weeks ago were practically deserted. Now they are filled with clients. A public which in the last half of October was cold and apathetic toward the market is today disposed to buy stocks. Such a radical revision in feeling and comment—and also of course its commitments—has seldom happened.

Who brought it about? Stocks don't go up themselves," Henry Clews once remarked to James R. Keene, "they are put up." And the greatest manipulator the market place has ever known agreed with him. Hence the known agreed with him. Hence the question, who, rather than what, brought about last week's metamorphosis at the Stock Exchange? The answer is, J. P. Morgan. In September—and for some time before, with politics and the Steel suit, Morgan fought against odds—Tait, Wickersham, the Department of Justice—brief the governments. For a time the bears, too, were on top of him. Today their recent profits are largely in the Morgan banks (and very specially in the First National Bank) to the credit of Morgan and the men who followed him in his latest market exploit and helped him make it a success. For, while the financier, as I have said, took the initiative on the buy side with the advent of October, credit for restoring prices must also be given to his associates and colleagues among the financial giants at 2 Wall Street, of whom the foremost are George F. Baker and William H. Moore, and to the potent buying of the First Securities Company, which, I understand, accumulated tens of thousands of shares of dividend-paying stocks at the low prices of the early autumn.

Morgan in his enormous market operations, which, by the way, are undertaken only on momentous occasions (as when Steel was beset by its enemies in the 50's recently) used many agents and mediums for the accomplishment of his ends. These include banks and banking houses in New York, London, and Paris, at least two large trust companies, a capitalist whose wealth is not a topic of public discussion, but who is worth anywhere from three hundred million dollars, and a manipulator of rare skill in handling the machinery of the market.

TELEPHONES FOR FARMERS.

The first farmer who discovered the value of the telephone was the market gardener. Next came the bonanza farmer of the Red River valley—such a man, for instance, as Oliver Dalrymple, of North Dakota, who found that by the aid of the telephone he could plant and harvest 30,000 acres of wheat in a single season. Then, not more than half a dozen years ago, there arose a veritable Telephone Crusade among the farmers of the middle west. Cheap telephones, that were fairly good, had by this time been made possible by the improvements of the Bell engineers; and stores of what could be done by telephone became the favorite gossip of the day. One farmer had kept his barn from being burned down by telephoning for his neighbors. Another had cleared \$600 of extra profit on the sale of his cattle by telephoning to the best market. A third had rescued a flock of sheep by sending quick news of an approaching blizzard. A fourth had saved his son's life by getting an instantaneous message to the doctor, and so on.

How the telephone saved a \$3,000, 300 fruit crop in Colorado, in 1909, is the story that is often told in the west. Until that year, the frosts in the spring nipped the buds. No farmer could be sure of his harvest. But in 1909 the fruit-growers bought smudge-pots—300,000 or more. Next an alliance was made with the United States Weather Bureau, so that whenever the Frost King came down from the north, a warning could be tele-

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 2—Maritime Province ships played an important part in achieving for the port of Montreal a record trade in their past seven months. 750 vessels arrived, an increase of 31 over last year, while customs returns showed a growth of nearly 1,600,000 dollars. During the season the Dominion Coal Company with their 26 steamers have sent 1,501,600 tons to the St. Lawrence ports of Montreal, Three Rivers and Quebec, against 1,304,000 tons for the season of year.
