News Briefs
WASHINGTON, Oct. 15—(AP)—New expedients were enlisted today to step up the production of war planes for both Great Britain and the United States.

ROME, Oct. 15—(AP)—Foreign observers here heard unverified reports today that the British Queen Mary recently was conveyed through the Mediterranean with troops aboard.

LONDON, Oct. 15—(CP)—When the Duke of Kent, youngest brother of the King, recently visited a hospital, one of the nurses was introduced to him as "sister Kay."

WINNIPEG, Oct. 15—(CP)—Officials of wheat pool organizations in the three Prairie Provinces announced today that they had agreed to reduce the spread between street and track prices on wheat delivered to the Canadian Wheat Board by one-half cent per bushel.

LONDON, Oct. 15—(CP Cable)—Formation of an Imperial War Cabinet in the near future is not considered likely in official circles in London. While there has been some agitation for such a step, especially in Australia, it is learned that no proposal has been put forward by responsible quarters in any part of the empire.

LONDON, Oct. 15—(CP Cable)—A young Canadian soldier standing uncomprehendingly at a large window sign played a part in the blaring of a theatre during the height of German air raids over London last night.

LONDON, Oct. 15—(CP)—Sir Edward Grigg, Under-Secretary for War, replying to a question in the House of Commons today, said that United States authorities have been asked to verify reports from international Red Cross delegates that British war prisoners in Germany are being mistreated either by segregation, rationing or by being kept in the open air.

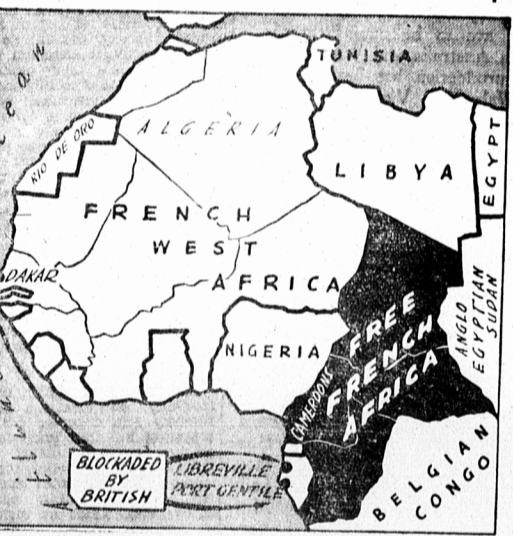
