### THE BEE INDUSTRY IN THIS PROVINCE

(Continued from page 9.)

COMB FOUNDATION. It is without doubt one of the most valuable inventions in the whole field of agriculture. Wax is the secretion of the bees generated in the process of which a large quantity of honey is consumed. It is estimated that the bees must consume fifteen to twenty pounds of honey in order to produce one pound of wax. This will indicate the great value of an artificial foundation stamped or rolled out of pure wax and all ready for the bees to work on. This foundation is made by the most delicate and accurate machinery and so perfect that after being drawn out and built on by the bees its presence is scarcely discoverable. With foundations to start upon the combs are always built straight and even which is a great help in the handling of the hive. It is usually made in several grades, the heavier being used in broad frames and the thinnest for fine honey in the comb of the surplus boxes. A pound of this costs about sixty to seventy cents here, and when we consider the amount of bee labor saved, its use is without question a item of great economy, saving putting sections together, stained wire for holding the sections in place, feeders for feeding such as weak colonies. Besides those there are in great variety, section holders, foundation fasteners and cutters, wire imbedders, queen cages, cell protectors, queen nurseries, swarm catchers and quite a lot of other accessories.

THE AMATEUR or small keeper would need but a few of these. With a single hive outfit the following would make a fair commencement. One hive complete with bees and queen, two or three supers with sections and holders. One queen veil and if desirable a smoker. Two empty hives with equipment for young swarms. With these he would have a start which with care and attention he can in a few years enlarge to a large apiary. In 1908 my own apiary increased from eight hives up to twenty two, besides producing seven or eight hundred pounds of surplus honey. This however was an exceptionally good honey year.

About thirty years ago there was a very large number of bees kept in this Province and they almost constantly on sale in our old market building. They were then kept in the old fashioned box hives after ancient methods, and only the black or German bees. In a single year or two as if by an epidemic the whole bee population died out. The cause will probably never be known. It may have resulted from in-and-in breeding by which they were all too weak to withstand a severe winter, or possibly by an attack of foul brood, not easily discernable or prevented in the box hive and the existing system of management. The industry is now assuming a new life and bees are now to be found in many parts of the province and should be found on every well regulated farm.

Bees can be handled alike by men and women or intelligent boys or girls. Some of the most successful apiarists on this continent are the fair sex. The labor and attention required is small in comparison with the benefits derived.

THE WINTERING DIFFICULTY. has been in the past the most formidable obstacle, but with a good dry, airy, frost proof cellar and a careful regard to modern method and conditions the losses from this source has now been largely overcome.

SWARMING. of bees is nature's method of increase. In this province about the month of July the old hive becomes over crowded. There is no room for more honey or more bees. In the middle of some bright day all the active bees in the hive together with the old Queen hurry hither skelter

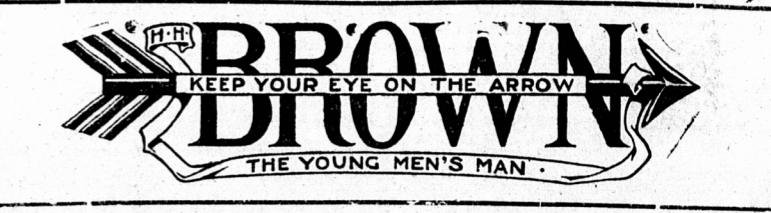

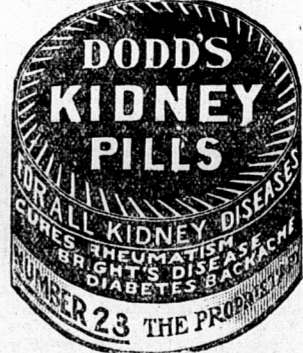


out, and after whirling about in the air like a small cloud they settle in a compact cluster on the limb of an adjacent tree, or some similar place. They will usually remain in cluster an hour or two while their scouts are supposed to be hunting amongst the low trees or other hiding places for a new home. The alert bee-keeper when a swarm emerges will have a spare hive in readiness. This hive with the cover off he will place under the newly formed cluster as near to the bees as possible. As soon as the bees are well settled a sudden shake or jar of the limb will cause the mass to drop into the box where they will soon settle down to business. In the evening they can be moved to their permanent stand. Sometimes a sheet is spread under the cluster, an open hive placed at the edge, the bees are shaken into

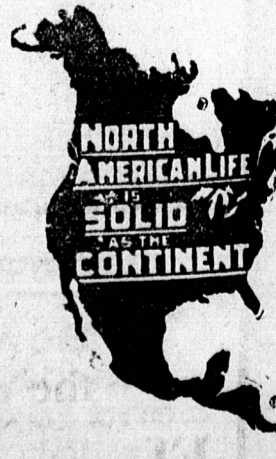
