CANADIAN WOMEN SEND GREETINGS TO ENGLISH SISTERS

MONTREAL, QUE., Aug. 23.—In congratulating its sister organization in England on the achievement of complete political equity for women, the Canadian Alliance for Women's Vote, of Quebec, sent letters to the St. John's Social and Political Alliance, which is the Catholic suffrage organization in Britain. The message is as follows: "The members of the Canadian Alliance for Women's Vote, of Quebec, rejoice in your success. You have at last secured the reward of your marvellous efforts. Sixty years of striving have brought you to the realization of that which you were pursuing. I thank you for your good wishes concerning the women of Quebec. The women of the Province of Quebec, who are actually the only women of the Dominion and the only white women of the British Empire deprived of their provincial rights, enjoy the same victory in the very near future. May our legislators understand that justice and civilization go hand in hand, and that by the conquest of selfishness and the recognition of everyone's rights humanity gradually progresses. With our best congratulations." (Signed) Idolia Saint-Jean, president.

Among the letters received by the St. Jean Alliance one of the most prized, was that of the Bishop of Pella, who said: "What not long ago was looked upon as an absurdity, the inalienable right of common place of national life. Let women use their vote, so hardly won of the community, especially women and children, and to defend the rights of the Catholic Church and Catholic education."

SKOWHEGAN, Maine, Aug. 18.—Bessie McKillop, 2:01 1-2, the Presque Isle free-for-aller, more than met her match yesterday when she was outtraced in the free-for-all at the last day of the Skowhegan fair by Millie W., a newcomer from Nyack, N. Y., taking the last two heats, which she won by a margin of two beats. The Arrostook mare being on her heels all the time, and forced Millie to go the last half in 1:00 3-4 and the mile in 2:05 3-4, a new track record. A considerable drop from the old mark of 2:06 1-4, held by Peter Kennedy. The bay stallion Jackson Grattan was injured during the race and had to be destroyed.

Gwendolyn Aubrey, the Arrostook mare, a heavy favorite in the 2:12 race, was beaten out in a sensational five heat race by the Boston mare Gleaming Silk, handled by "Red" Hanafin, but she clipped her mark to do it from 2:11 1-4 to 2:08 3-4. 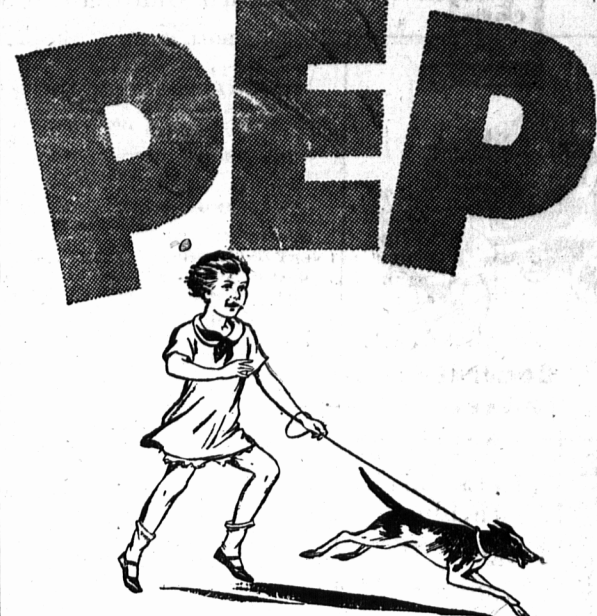
