FISHERMEN MAKE TRIP ON CREDIT

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 1—(C.P.) Newfoundland fishermen who cannot afford the expense of the yearly trip to the fishing grounds off the coast of Labrador will in future be "staked" by the government.

Learning that the cost of the journey was preventing many fishermen from going North, the government decided to arrange with the transportation companies to bring them to the fishery.

Under the arrangement, the men will travel north at the government's expense and will make payment when they come back in the fall with the proceeds of their catches. The offer has been made more acceptable through the provision that payment need not be made in cash, as the government will accept cod or other fish to the value of the fare advanced.
