At a large and representative meeting of the Farmers' Institute of Tracadie held on Friday evening last. The following resolution was introduced and unanimously passed:—Whereas grants are annually voted by the Provincial Government to Exhibition Associations with a view to elevating the standard of Agriculture in this Province, and Whereas, we hereby express our disapproval of allowing "hot house growers" and holders of small plots of land near Charlottetown to exhibit against farmers—such procedure not being conducive to the best interests of Agriculture, and Whereas, Tracadie Farmers' Institute has held local exhibitions of farm dairy and garden products domestic handwork etc., during the past two years and whereas, we believe that said local exhibitions have been of greater value from an educational standpoint, than the central exhibitions and that much could be done among other Institutes to promote their efficiency and lead to their further progress and advancement. Therefore resolved that we the members of The Farmers' Institute of Tracadie respectfully request that in future half the grants that are annually voted—on amendments equal to half the sums voted for exhibition purposes—be divided equally among the Farmers' Institutes to be used as prizes at local exhibitions of farm, dairy and garden products live and dressed wool, domestic handwork etc. and that country exhibitions be held only for exhibiting live stock—auction sales of pure-bred stock to be held in connection therewith and further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the commissioner of Agriculture; also to our representatives in the Legislature, requesting that they bring this matter before the Government, and to the press for publication.

On Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock the annual Methodist Missionary meeting will be held in the Mt. Herbert Church addressed by T. C. James and Dr. Ayers. These gentlemen will also speak in the interests of the Laymen's Missionary movement in the Methodist church at Pownal at seven o'clock p. m. All are cordially invited. The offering being in aid of the mission fund.

A pretty wedding ceremony was performed at St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Monday morning at seven o'clock when Miss Janie Craig, City, became the wife of Robert William Sample of Peak's Station. The bride was attended by Miss Mary Summers and the groom by L. F. Monaghan, Rev. Father McLellan performing the ceremony. The happy young couple then drove to their future home at Peak's Station where they were heartily greeted by their many friends.
