McLellan was chosen first vice-president and Rev. L. E. G. Davies, second vice-president. Miss Eleanor Green was elected secretary-treasurer and Heath Strong, K.C., hon. solicitor. President's Report
 Dr. J. A. MacPhee as president of the Society gave a comprehensive report of the year's work. He stated that there is more delinquency among girls than in former years. He stressed the necessity of the state looking after children whose parents have been sent to jail for various offences. Dr. MacPhee cited two instances within the last year in Summerside where children whose parents had been arrested and sent to jail for prohibition offences had been left without anything to eat and in another case had been dumped out on the street, and that the Society had been asked to look after them. Dr. MacPhee said these were not cases for either the Children's Aid Society or the Orphanage and that arrangements should be made that the state or town authorities should immediately take care of these children. The Society is at present time being put to considerable expense to look after the children of the
