Trustees' Report

Your Trustees herewith submit the forty-fourth annual report of the Prince Edward Island Hospital. At each annual meeting for the past few years there has been some criticism of the Trustees' report on the grounds that while we closed our year's work on April 30th, the April bills were unpaid and the report therefore did not show the true position of the Hospital finances.

report shows twelve months' receipts the reduction would have been over \$4,000. We do not know, however, that a surplus is anything for hospital management to be proud of. Rather should we aim to be able to give to every person in the province the best treatment possible, and the advantage of the most modern hospital equipment. To provide this means little chance for surpluses, and we have already ordered new and very necessary equipment that will cost us over \$2,000, and we require about as much more.

We are particularly pleased to report that the promise made by the Local Government last year to your Trustees regarding additional financial assistance has been kept and that our grant is now \$2,000 per annum instead of \$500.

This, however, is only a small part of what we are entitled to when comparison is made with other provinces, but we have been told by the Government that further assistance will be given as soon as possible. There seems no sound reason why the hospitals of this province should not be put on a per patient per day basis, the same as is done elsewhere, and then we would receive assistance according to our needs.

In our report of last year we promised to wait upon the City Council and ask for a grant such as is given by cities elsewhere, but we were asked by some of the City Councillors to defer doing so for the present, and to this we agreed.

This year, however, we have to point out that during the eleven months closing March 31st, 1927, we treated forty-five patients from the City of Charlottetown absolutely free. This we cannot afford to do, and we hope that when this is brought to the attention of the City Council, they will give our claim for a yearly grant proper consideration.

It is only fair to say, however, that since the foundation of the Hospital, the money needed for its establishment, enlargement and improved equipment has been very largely donated by the citizens of Charlottetown, their contribution being out of all proportion to the population when compared to the population outside of Charlottetown served by the Hospital.

The Endowment Fund has been increased during the year by the sum of \$2,500, made up by the Bequest Late L. E. Prowse \$1,000, Bequest Late Stewart Anderson \$1,200, Bequest Late Mary Jane Lane \$300. And the Fund now amounts to \$50,588.32.

At the last annual meeting a resolution was passed instructing the Trustees to investigate regarding remodeling the present Hospital and the construction of a new one, and to report as early as possible. This we proceeded to do, and had plans prepared for both, but owing to the uncertainty as to just where the Canadian National Railway would make the extensive improvements they had been contemplating for some time, and as there was a possibility that the project of our position, we felt it was useless to call a public meeting, and we had something definite to report. The railway plans are now being disclosed, and we will not be much, if any, affected by the new arrangements.

We therefore wish to say to you tonight that we have plans for remodeling which we believe are suitable to our needs for the future, including contagious disease ward, maternity ward, new laboratory and X-Ray Department, and many other modern arrangements as found in present day hospitals. We also have plans for an entirely new up-to-date building. As we were not in a position to call tenders on either plan, we cannot therefore give you the exact cost, but for remodeling we will require approximately \$30,000, and for a new building, including a new site not less than \$225,000. If we built a new building on our own ground this would be cut by probably \$15,000 to \$20,000.
