FAMOUS MURDER CASE RECALLED

Greatest Criminal of 19th Century Hanged

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 8.—Twenty-five years ago today the greatest criminal of the nineteenth century, Herman M. Mudgett, alias H. H. Holmes, paid the penalty of his crimes on the gallows in this city. The man was suspected of having committed more than a score of murders, and was convicted of atrocities the blackness of which is almost unparalleled.

The crime for which Holmes was hanged was the murder of B. P. Pitzel, in this city. Pitzel, a chemist, died as the result of a chemical explosion, the body being unrecognizable. Holmes telegraphed his widow to come from Indianapolis to identify the remains. When she arrived he told her that the body was not that of her husband, but that the two of them were in a plot to collect \$10,000 insurance. She entered into the plot and it might have succeeded had not Holmes separated her from her children, and murdered them, in the hope that he would be able to secure all the proceeds of the crime for himself.

Holmes was a native of Gilmanton, N. H., and came of a respectable family. At the age of fifteen he taught school and in 1879 he began the study of medicine while a clerk in a drug store at East Concord, N. H. In 1881 he completed a medical course at the University of Michigan.

It was the next year that he assumed the name of H. H. Holmes and appeared for the first time as a criminal in the role of an insurance swindler. In 1887 he took up his residence in Chicago and became a clerk in a drug store in Sixty-third Street. The next year he bought the drug store and also a plot of ground near by, where he commenced the erection of a building later known as "Holmes castle," and which was believed to have been the scene of many mysterious crimes. During this year he married a Miss Myrtle Belknap of Wilmette, Ill.

In 1891 Holmes installed a Mrs. Conner whose husband had clerked for him in the "castle" as house

Military Training For Immigrants

OTTAWA, May 8.—Compulsory military service as a means of assimilating the foreign immigrant was urged in the house of commons yesterday by Brigadier General W. A. Griesbach, member for West Edmonton. "Some scheme of educating and assimilating the foreign immigrant is absolutely imperative," declared Brig-General Griesbach. "The churches are powerless. The Canadian system of education fails to meet the situation."

He advocated a system of universal compulsory military service under which the young foreigners between the ages of nineteen and twenty-two years would spend three months a year in military training. During that time the foreigner would learn to speak English. He would learn to keep clean, to become obedient and he would learn the responsibility of citizenship.

Millions Of Fish Fry

OTTAWA, May 9.—A statement given out today says that nearly 247 millions of whitefish fry were distributed this spring by federal fish hatcheries operating on the shores of the Great Lakes. Of this number, close to thirteen million were transferred to British Columbia waters, and the balance were released in the Great Lakes. About five and three-quarter million of herring fry were also released, making a total distribution of two hundred and fifty-two millions.

These figures record the operations of the plants at Collingwood, Sarnia and Kingsville. The fourth hatchery at Belleville was closed before the distributing season because of polluted waters. At Collingwood the number of fry released was nearly double that of last year. The total distribution from the three hatcheries in 1920 was less than one hundred and fifty millions, or more than one hundred millions behind this year's achievement. The comparative figures follow:
