CALM FOLLOWS STORM IN SPAIN

(Canadian Press Despatch.) MADRID VIA PARIS.—Premier Eduardo Dato, addressing a number of press representatives, said that calm prevailed in Spain but that he considered that very grave problems faced the government. He did not believe, however, he said, that these problems were beyond solution. The dissolution of the Cortes was possible he said, but not probable and urgent questions might arise which it would be necessary for parliament to discuss.

PORTUGUESE REPEL SEVERAL GERMAN RAIDS.

LONDON.—"Portuguese troops have repelled several German raids during June," says the official statement issued here this evening. "We captured a few prisoners last night as a result of a raid north of Gouzon court. South of the Ypres-Comines Canal a hostile raiding party caught in our artillery barrage failed to reach our trenches."

WASHINGTON.—The military registration of young men in the United States has been carried through successfully. Drafts for the army will be taken from amongst the 10,000,000 whose names now appear on the government lists. The experiences of Great Britain, Canada and Australia have made it easier for the American government to begin its preparations on the compulsory basis. In communities where the Germans and Austrians have shown truculence in their attitude the government has had the strong support of newspapers like the Chicago Tribune, which recently said:—

"Opposition to the draft will be met by rifle fire. We are convinced that any preliminary gentleness in dealing with the situation will only make the results more costly. Men responsible for exciting foolish or selfish people to mob resistance of conscription ought to be shot. They not only ought to be, but we have no doubt they will be."

A WASHINGTON SQUARE BACCHANALIA.

Harold M. Harvey in Cartoons Magazine. The massive gray Arch rises sharp and square against the cool, deep blue of early dawn. To the south a Neapolitan, fresh from his bed of sleep, enters the square. Briskly he hastens along the hedged walk to ten hours in some half-completed subway excavation, a willing toiler for his dark-eyed Peppina and the little ones. From the north, past the century-old, low-lying, red-brick strongholds of aristocracy, with their marble thresholds and their pineapple newel posts, weaves a laughing crowd; a hula dancer, her grass skirt swaying seductively, her bare ankles circled with brilliant flowers; a sailor; in half the crimson of his lips smudged with many kisses, a leopard skin slipping from one painted shoulder; a gold and silver girl, her flesh like lead in the half-light; an odalisque. In the purple shadows of the monument they wave the Italian greet. He has met them many times before. They have danced while he has slept. Above them, from his pedestal against the Arch, General George Washington looks down benignly. These are his people, citizens of the great nation which he fathered, sojourner in quaint Greenwich-Village which he knew of old. The revelers are American-born; the laborer is an adopted son.
