## Highton Gives Great Performance As Hawks Whip Maple Leafs 4-1

TORONTO, Nov. 14—(CP)—Chicago Black Hawks made the "finishing touch" play dividends Saturday for a 4-1 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs before 10,255 fans who saw youthful Vic Highton in the Chicago nets give one of the National Hockey League season's most polished and unimpaired performances.

Despite a three-stitch face injury acquired in the second period when struck by a blue-line drive, the former Vancouver amateur stayed in the game and stood off all attacks until 11:25 of the third period when Lorne Carr was left unguarded on Highton's coast.

## Canadiens Score Shut-Out Over Red Wings, Remain Only Undefeated Team

DETROIT, Nov. 14—(AP)—The astonishing Montreal Canadiens, alone undefeated in the National Hockey League, extended their winning streak to five games tonight by blanking the Detroit Red Wings, 2-0 before 13,355 spectators. Elmer Lach and Gerry E. Hoffman scored for Montreal.

Dark-haired Bill Durnan, 29-year-old rookie goaltender, kicked off 20 shots and allowed the season's first shut-out. Highton was the first time Detroit had been blanked in 67 games since the 1942 league playoffs. Durnan now has league-high goals in six games for an incredible record in this season of win-or-open hockey.

The victory boosted Montreal's record to a game and a half over the idle Toronto Maple Leafs. Montreal swept both ends of a weekend doubleheader with Detroit, defeating champions having won 4-1 Saturday at Montreal.

MONTREAL, Nov. 14—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens rolled up their fourth straight victory and became the only undefeated team in the National Hockey League Saturday night when they whipped Detroit Red Wings 4-1 before a crowd of 12,203.

The sell-out crowd—the third in four N.H.L. games here—saw the Canucks take a three-goal margin in the first two periods and break even in the third to hand the champions their first loss of this young season. The team played back in Detroit tonight.

As a member of the football teams at Giesbe College, Technical High School and later Ottawa University, he distinguished himself as a capable player. His sports enthusiasm not restricted to football, he was competent on the track and in gymnastics, paddled with Rideau Aquatic Club and from 1938-1939 was in the junior fours, Dominion champions."

"Chief analyst of the R. C. A. F. for the past year, Bob is married and has a one year old son. His parents are both of Charlottetown and both formerly of The Guardian staff. His father was a court reporter here for some years, and for several years past has been on the Hensard staff, House of Commons. Bob himself lived in Charlottetown until nine years of age, and got his first three years schooling at West Kent School. He holds the position of chief analyst of the R. C. A. F. He was formerly with the National Research Council and later with the Dominion Labor-Union, Ottawa."

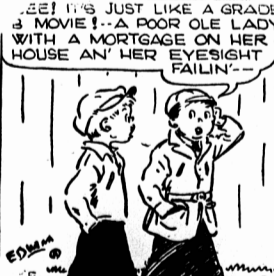

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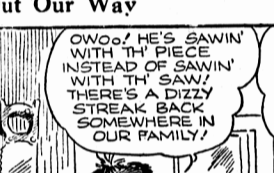
