IN MEMORIAM

MRS. NEIL DARRACH.

At Fortune Bridge on March 26th, A. D. 1916, Mrs. Neil Darrach passed away at the ripe old age of 84 years to join the innumerable throng of those who have gone to their eternal reward. Mrs. Darrach leaves three sons to mourn the loss of a devoted mother and a wise counsellor; namely Fredrick in Morona, Archibald in Bangor, Angus on the homestead near Fortune Bridge. She also leaves three brothers who survive her one brother in the city of Charlottetown, P. E. I. a brother in the State of Massachusetts and a brother in Kansas City. A sister she leaves behind for a short period to lament her death and loss of her companionship in her latter years, Mrs. Darrach who's maiden name was Jane Brown and formerly of Covehead Road, although deprived of her eyesight and blind for about eight years this affliction coupled with her sickness that continued all the time of her death, still Mrs. Darrach in the long years of her widowhood by her cheerfulness throughout her affliction and illness, her kindness and friendly way in her daily life and conversation, gained for her a multitude of friends besides her neighbours at Fortune Bridge as well as at Dundas, where she and her husband, the late Neil Darrach lived for a good number of years, and she was buried beside her husband who died about 25 years ago and was buried in the first cemetery of the Pioneers of Dundas. Although the roads were nearly impassable on the day of her funeral a large number of people of both Dundas and her neighbourhood, Fortune Bridge, gathered to show their respect to their late friend and neighbour. The Rev. William McLeod, Presbyterian Minister at Dundas, conducted the funeral services at the home of the departed and at the grave Rev. Mr. McLeod preached a solemn and very acceptable sermon to the gathered friends of the departed one. A. G. M.

LONDON, May 8.—Serious rioting took place in Budapest on Sunday, according to a Central News despatch

Fifteen of the crowd were killed, when the Honved garrison fired. Two hundred arrests were made.
