Japan Does Not Favor Soviet Pact

TOKYO, Japan, March 9. (By the Canadian Press)—Japan sees no necessity for a pact of non-aggression with the Soviet such as proposed by the Soviet Government, according to information obtained in an official quarter here, recently. If the pact were modelled on the Franco-Soviet treaty, it was said, it would constitute a military alliance and Japan has no desire to enter into any military alliance with the Soviet Government. Such treaties may be suited to conditions in Europe but are not regarded here as adapted to conditions in the Far East.

Russia is a potential enemy of Japan if the Soviet government upon the completion of the first or second five year plan should launch upon a campaign of aggression in the Far East comparable to the policy of the Czarist government. Japan could not be bound to refrain from going to war in such a contingency.

It is understood that the pact of non-aggression proposed to Japan in a conversation between Litvinov and Yoshizawa in Moscow and again by Ambassador Troyanovsky in a recent talk with Premier Inukai would be modelled on the Franco-Soviet treaty, recently initiated, by which France and Russia undertake not to resort to war against one another and that in case of a third power acting aggressively against either signatory, the other signatory will remain neutral. If a pact between Russia and Japan should be drawn up modelled on the Franco-Soviet treaty, it was stated, Japan would regard such a treaty as very dangerous.

The Canada Shipping Act

OTTAWA, Ont., March 9. — (By the Canadian Press) — It will not be possible to bring down a bill amending and consolidating the Canada Shipping Act at the present session of Parliament, Alfred Durneau, Minister of Marine, informed the House of Commons today in answer to a question by Angus MacInnis (Labor, Vancouver South). The Minister stated with regret that the magnitude of the work involved made it impossible to bring down the bill at the present session. He anticipated, however, that amendments would be brought in to the coastal laws.

Trade Treaty Before House

OTTAWA, Ont., March 9.—Negotiations in respect to a new trade treaty between Canada and France were the subject of questions in the House of Commons this afternoon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Opposition leader, asked if negotiations were proceeding. "I ask this question," he added, "because I believe despatches have come from France which would indicate that the French Government was contemplating banning fresh fruits from Canada and putting a prohibitive duty of \$1.00 a bushel on imports of grain."

"No information has reached the Government, nor have we received any communications since the last despatch was sent indicating a willingness to resume discussions looking to an amended treaty," replied Premier R. B. Bennett.

"Flying Bishop" Takes Wife And Child

WINNIPEG, Man., March 9. — (By the Canadian Press) — Most Rev. W. A. Geddes, Anglican Bishop of MacKenzie River, known as the Flying Bishop of North America, has gone to Fort Chipewyan.
