*TOWN COUNCIL MEETING—The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday evening with Mayor Manson presiding. All the Councillors were present with the exception of Councillor Bell. The tender of The Warren Paving Co., for paving Spring Street with a concrete base and bituminous surface was accepted by a motion which was upheld by all the Councillors present, with the exception of Councillor Kelly, who said he was in favour of building the street, but not with the acceptance of the tender. Another motion was passed that the strip of roadway from the end of the concrete at the east end of Water Street to the bridge be concreted and the work be given to the Warren Paving Co. Coun. Kelly also made objection to this motion. A motion was passed by Coun Phillips, seconded by Coun. McNeill and passed unanimously that the field of Christopher Gunn at the east end of the town be purchased at \$600, the price tendered for the use of the town, with a view of erecting an abattoir. A motion was passed that the old board sidewalk on Court Street be pulled up as it is dangerous to citizens and a concrete sidewalk laid down as far as the rink. Electric light bills were passed as follows: Paid bills, \$689.34; unpaid, \$787.14. The town bills were not passed as the chairman of the Finance Committee, Coun. Bell, was not present. Several communications were read and filed. Mr. J. A. Brace verbally requested the Council to look into the surface water on his land on Granville Street, which he says is caused by the street being raised. Coun. McNeill, Chairman of the Street Committee, reported that the bitumast at the west end was completed and other minor repairs done. Coun. Phillips, chairman of Police Committee, reported 30 arrests for drunkenness; one conviction for stealing; one vagrant; four driving to common danger; two arrested for driving while drunk. Total fines, \$269.50. The milk test was also submitted and passed. Coun. Grady, Parks Committee, reported that the old bandstand in Dominion Square had been torn down and sold and a new one erected. After some discussion on the arrangements and plans for the new abattoir Council adjourned until Friday, 14th inst.—S.
