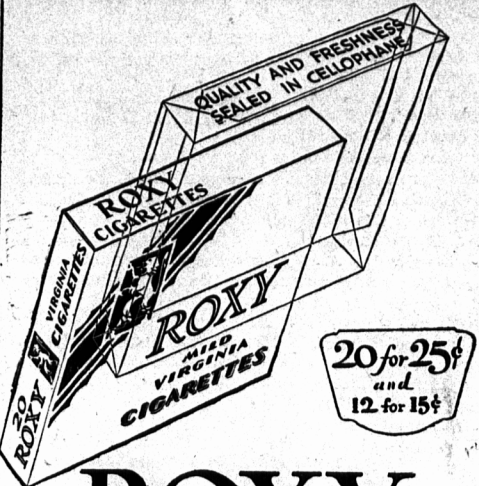

Scottish Catch Will Be Frozen In Brine Tanks

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By The Canadian Press)—Brinefreezing, a new method of preserving fish caught in the sea, the result of research work carried out at the Torry Research Station, Aberdeen, is regarded as a gratifying success and an exhibition of cod, sole, halibut and plaice and rock salmon frozen by this process was given recently at the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, London.

The fish had been caught by the research vessel City of Edinburgh weeks previously. Some of them were tried at the Department and guests enjoyed an early luncheon of fried fish at the Government's expense.

This new process, which it is claimed, revolutionizes the methods of preserving fish. Trawlers will brine-freeze fish as they are caught, instead of, as at present, storing them in ice while the trawler is at sea. A. Lumley, superintendent of the Torry Station, said that one of the disadvantages of fish frozen under older methods, had been that it

was not ultimately nice to eat. In the brine-freezing process the fish are dipped into a solution of sodium chloride (or brine) carried on board in a tank at a temperature of five degrees Fahrenheit. Then they are stored at a temperature of five degrees, and experiments have shown that fish so treated can be kept in perfect condition for three months.

The cost of installing the new plant on board is about \$8,500, but it is claimed there would be a real saving, because of the avoidance of loss on fish caught early in the voyage. A Billingsgate fish merchant says that brine-frozen fish was almost as good as freshly-caught fish.

—ELDERLY RESIDENT OF SUMMERSIDE PASSES — There passed away in Summerside on Tuesday at noon one of its oldest and most highly respected citizens, Mr. William McMurdo, in his 84th year. Mr. McMurdo was born in January, 1849, at Kelvin, P. E. I., but was a resident of Summerside for over sixty years, in fact almost since its inception. On first coming to Summerside he entered the employ of the late R. T. Holman, but after a few years he went into partnership with the late George Warren, S. M. Hicks, and his brother David McMurdo, the firm carrying on a very successful business for many years. He afterwards retired and assisted his son, Dr. J. A. McMurdo in his dental practice. Mr. McMurdo was a man of exemplary character, brought up under the guidance of parents of the old Presbyterian faith, his character was moulded along lines of courage and endurance and a love for the simple pleasures of life and a staunch believer in God and His Holy Word. He was for over sixty years a member of the Summerside Presbyterian Church, being one of the very few remaining of the first congregation. He was a teacher of the Sunday School and Bible Class until a short time ago. He was a man of who made lasting friendships and will be missed by many both in town and country. Although in failing health, he was only laid up for about three weeks and the end came quickly at the last. He leaves to mourn his widow, formerly, Agnes Brehaut, also three sons, Wm. J., in Leaburn, Saskatchewan; C. B., in Alberta, and Dr. J. A., in Summerside; also three brothers, A. R. McMurdo on the old homestead at Kelvin, Albert, in California and two sisters, Mrs. D. W. Walker, of Wilnot and Mrs. Peter Sinclair, of Summerfield, P. E. I., to all of whom sympathy is extended. The funeral takes place this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Presbyterian Church.—S.

SAD DROWNING TRAGEDY IN SOURIS RIVER

Miss Eileen Paquet Victim Of Bathing Fatality.

The citizens of Souris were shocked on Tuesday evening when the news that Miss Eileen Paquet was drowned, spread through the town like wild fire.

Miss Paquet and friends went bathing about 8:15 p.m. going in at the western end of the beach near the eastern approach to Souris West Bridge. The Souris River current at this point is very strong and Miss Paquet was swept off her feet. Her brother-in-law, Mr. Max Madore, also found himself in danger. The third member of the party Mr. James O'Hanley, Jr., lent his assistance and Mr. Madore was enabled to reach safety. But the rescue of Miss Paquet proved more difficult, and though Mr. O'Hanley made a valiant effort, it proved in vain and the current and undertow swept her away.

Hundreds of Souris citizenry thronged the beach leaving the town quite deserted, many assisting in the search for the body. Several motor boats also rendered aid and the search was continued till a late hour Tuesday evening. The body was recovered yesterday morning. An inquest was deemed unnecessary.

Miss Paquet, a young lady of nineteen years was of estimable character and held a position on the Cox Hotel staff at Souris. There are left to mourn, her mother, Mrs. Elliot Paquet; three sisters, Mrs. Aeneas Smith, Mrs. Max Madore and Mrs. John Grant, and two brothers, Lawrence and Leigh. The Guardian extends sincere sympathy to the sorrowing family in their sudden bereavement.

This is the first bathing accident to occur on Souris beach and probably would not have happened had the bathers not been so near the channel, as the beach fronting the bathing houses is considered one of the safest in the Maritime Provinces.

Mrs. Keith - Millers Love Affairs Heard In Court

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 10.—Captain W. N. Lancaster's mental anguish at the loss of Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller's love was brought into court records today by the flyer himself in his trial for the slaying of Haden Clarke, young author who has superseded Lancaster in Mrs. Keith-Miller's affections.

Lancaster's testimony was the story of a man in love for five years his love upholding him through financial reverses until he learned that the woman he loved since he flew with her from London to Australia in 1927, had decided in his absence in search of funds, to marry Clarke.

The letters told Lancaster that Clarke and the aviatrix had fallen in love during his absence, and as they worked on a book portraying her life story, they told him of their plans to marry, the defendant testified.

"I showed the letters to Gentry Shelton, Jr., a close friend who had gone to St. Louis with me at conclusion of one unsuccessful western business trip," Lancaster continued.

"I was puzzled. I didn't know what to do. Finally I sent the pair a telegram wishing them luck."

The flyer, charged with killing Clarke in his room at the Keith-Miller home within 12 hours after his arrival from St. Louis, testified he bought a pistol in St. Louis and loaded it in Nashville.

Much of the flyer's testimony on direct examination by defence counsel had to do with his experience on the western trip, when he sought unsuccessfully for funds for himself, Mrs. Keith-Miller and Clarke.

Sweet Pepper Canned Without Water

Remove the seeds and stems from sweet peppers. Pack dry in smallest size sterilized jars. Put on top without completely sealing jars. Sterilize in hot water bath 2 hours. The processing brings out a thick liquor as you will find in commercially canned pickles. When only part of a can of peppers is required, cover the remainder with cooking oil or melted paraffin. Store in dark place.

Salt Canned Beans

String and cut fresh snap beans as if for immediate use; tightly pack a jar with alternate layers of the sliced uncooked beans, add salt allowing 1-2 cup of salt to each quart of beans; then fasten jar tight with some of the salt on top. If enough brine to cover the beans does not develop in a few days, slightly salted water may be added. These will keep crisp and green for months. When opened they must be sacked over night; one hour may be plenty, then parboil and drain them once or twice in fresh water to remove salt, and proceed as for fresh beans. Any enquiries for more specific information on canning vegetables will receive prompt attention.

Will Try Again

(Canadian Press) CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—Twice unsuccessful in trans-Atlantic flight, Stanislaus Hauser, Polish-American flyer, will try it again—this time from Chicago to Poland. The aviator announced he would take off within the next two months. Whether the flight would be non-stop or sail for refueling at New York, he said, depends on the gasoline capacity of his new plane.
