LONDON HOUSE.

THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

Latest from Summerside and Prince County.

Herbert Inman returned home last evening and Arthur Brennan returned on the previous evening from Fredericton, N. B. where they completed a special course of instruction in the Military School. Messrs Inman and Brennan are members of No. 3 Co., 82 Regiment of this town.

February though having begun fairly mild, the first day being 30 degrees above zero at the coldest time, has since been a repetition of the preceding month. On the second the minimum temperature was four degrees below, on the third six below, on the fourth six below and on the fifth again six below. The highest temperature yesterday was three below at noon. On the previous day the highest temperature was two below, while on Wednesday the highest was three below zero.

The Scenery of Jamaica.

Here is an admirable pen-picture of Jamaican scenery, given by Miss R. Pullen-Burry in "Jamaica as It Is, 1903."

"The coloring is superb. To an artistic mind, there is scarcely an hour in the day, when looking on to the hills, that a beautiful view is not to be obtained. Sometimes the mountain summits are veiled in white mists, but at sunset the colors are grand, and for that only, are to my mind, worth the journey to Jamaica. The foliage and the parasitical growth, the hanging festoons which drape from tree to tree, must be seen to be appreciated. Tropical vegetation is in all its glory here. Innumerable ferns and palm-trees wave in the air along the banks of the well-kept roads. Plantains and bananas rear their ragged leaves against the sky. Exquisitely green cedars (not those we know) are a beautiful feature of the landscape, with orange-trees bearing blossom and fruit simultaneously. Tamarinds and gums spring from rocky crags, shrubs and creepers everywhere, the latter intertwine themselves in the most wonderful way over tree parasites, back again to the road bank, then you trace them twenty yards or so further on, embracing gigantic stems. Not a single tree seems familiar. One feels as if one were always walking in a botanical garden; the wealth of flowering plants, of edible fruit and vegetables, strikes one wherever one goes. How refreshing and how nourishing are the articles of food which Nature, in an open-handed generosity, not to be found in less favored climes, scatters broadcast over these islands! If negroes have yams, bread-fruit, oranges, bananas, coconuts, growing at their back door without the trouble of cultivating them—for anything once stuck into the ground will grow—how can you expect them to work six days out of seven?"

Sir Charles Scott.

Sir Charles Scott, the British Ambassador at St. Petersburg, whose position, in view of the Far East situation is one of extreme difficulty, has passed forty-five years in the diplomatic service, which he entered when a youth of twenty. His record of work covers no fewer than fourteen capitals great and small. A graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, he began his career as an attaché at Paris, and worked his way from capital to capital until, in 1893, he became Ambassador at Copenhagen, where there is little to do but plenty to report. He remained five years at the Danish Court, when he was selected for the important position at St. Petersburg in 1898, and has since gone through some exciting episodes in connection with Russia's flanking movements in Manchuria. He was made a G.C.M.G. in 1899.

Reafforestation of Wales.

A conference of delegates from various county councils of Wales was held recently at Haverfordwest to consider the question of establishing a school of forestry. Mr. Robinson, of North Pembroke, pointed out that there were a million acres of waste land in Wales which if planted with trees would in 30 years be worth forty or fifty million pounds, while the total outlay of planting would not exceed £3,000,000. A single acre could be planted for £6, and in 30 years' time it would be worth £40 to £50. It was resolved to establish a school of forestry for the principality.

AN ESTIMATE OF DARWIN.

Famous Thinker Was a Sweet-Natured, Quiet Country Gentleman.

Sir Leslie Stephen, in the last instalment of his "Reminiscences" in The Atlantic Monthly, expresses a high opinion of Darwin, whom he knew personally. He says:

"I had the privilege of seeing something of Darwin in his later years. To me, and my opinion was not exceptional, he appeared to be simply the most lovable person whom I ever encountered. A little party of us used at one time to take long Sunday tramps in the neighborhood of London. Those were days to be marked with a white stone when Darwin received us at the famous house at Down. It is in the quiet region of chalk downs, which had been left untouched in the gaps of the network of railways; and still looked as rural as it had a century earlier. One could expect to meet the old smugglers whose paths from the coast to London were laid through the unfrequented district. There Darwin found an admirable retreat for contemplating flowers and bees and worms, and for slowly elaborating the thoughts which had revolutionized science. He was as free from pretensions as if his investigations had no more claims to respect than those of a commonplace pigeon-fancier. The simplicity of the man was evident in the delightful easy terms in which he lived with a family which was worthy of his affection. I could sympathize with the young German who burst into tears on leaving the house, touched by the contrast between the famous thinker and the sweet-natured, quiet country gentleman, so free from the pedantry which sometimes haunts the professor's chair."
