DEBATE IS CONTINUED BY MR. SINCLAIR

Lesson To Parents "In Me, Gangster"

A CROOK STORY THAT IS DIFFERENT.

With about the same frequency that leap year rolls around a picture comes to the screen which flagrantly defies the conventions and still furnishes mighty good entertainment. Such a picture came to the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday for its initial showing locally, and it more than satisfied the appetites of movie lovers.

Primarily "Me, Gangster" is the story of just an average boy who lacks parental influence or precept and who has a lot of idle time on his hands with the inevitable result. He gets into trouble through his associations, escapes the law by narrow margins and finally is caught and becomes firmly convinced that you can't be a criminal and win.

Not exactly a new theme, but it is life and it is logical, and that is the way it is told on the screen.

Aside from the fact that the picture furnishes plenty of human drama and is finely enacted, Walsh has proved that a picture of crime and criminals, thieves and police, running battles and all else may be filmed without the aid of machine and riot guns, the taking of human life, lurid melodrama and all the other accepted formulas which have drenched stories of this sort in the past.

Don Terry, former Harvard athlete and recent discovery of Walsh, plays the leading role and acquits himself with surprising credit in spite of the fact that it is his very first appearance on any screen. June Gollyer, always pretty and charming, reveals hitherto undiscovered dramatic talent as the girl in the case and one of the best balanced casts to show in a picture in many moons is seen with such brilliancy as Anders Randolph, Stella Adams, Burr McIntosh, Walter James, Arthur Stone, Nigel De Brulier, Carol Lombard, Joe Brown, Bob Perry and Harry Cattie.

The expenditures that the provinces were called upon to make under the Highway Act of 1919, Mr. Sinclair said, were met by borrowings by the provinces entirely, and in Prince Edward Island the provincial debt was doubled by the amount it was necessary to raise to take advantage of one highway grant. They did not attempt to build roads to the standard aimed at and attained in the larger provinces. In fact they could only undertake the system of drainage and of properly constructing the bridges and making roads passable over the low and rough places. They did not in any degree attempt under the Highway grant to surface the roads, because that would have entailed such a large expenditure in importing the necessary material from the other Maritime Provinces that it would have used up the whole grant. There fore to extend the highway grant for another five years would mean further heavy borrowings for the Island province in order to put herself in a position where she could obtain the benefits that were extended to the other provinces. At the time the moneys were being expended in the Prince Edward Island, in order to get the full benefit of the 40 percent from the Federal treasury within the time that was allowed, the government of P. E. I. passed an order-in-council expressing their view that they would not be able to earn the full amount and asking the Federal Government to allow the cities of Charlottetown and Summerside to put up the 40 percent and continue the highway through the cities. This was accepted by the Federal Government and the cities put up the 40 percent.

The same was true Mr. Sinclair declared with respect to the grant for technical education. The matter came before the royal commission investigating maritime claims, and the commission in its report recommended that a distinction be made so far as Prince Edward Island was concerned in the distribution of the funds granted by parliament for technical education, as was not the case in the other provinces. It was also recommended by the commission that it be extended, if possible, to giving instruction to fishermen. In passing legislation of the kind that is asked for by this resolution in the smaller provinces and those in the more distant parts of Canada are placed under a handicap as compared with those provinces which are more centrally located. Further there were no demands from the electors in Prince Edward Island for legislation of the kind. There was no movement among the people there for a larger grant or a renewal of the grant of federal aid to highways. There was a movement among the people of Prince Edward Island favoring expenditure of federal money in such directions as railroad development rather than for highways technical education. It was better, he thought, that the Federal Government should spend only upon those things which were justified by the British North America Act rather than infringe upon the rights of the provinces. For this reason he opposed the resolution.

 OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 22—Canadian egg markets continue very firm and price advances are general. American markets are closed today.

Toronto: The egg market here is very firm and unchanged. A car of B. C. S. is reported rolling here at 44 cents, firsts 43 cents, pullet extras 41 cents, f.o.b. Vancouver.

Montreal: Quotations on the egg market here continue firm with prices working higher under light receipts. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 47 to 48 cents; firsts 44 to 45 cents; pullet extras 41 to 42 cents. B. C. eggs are offered on spot at extras 52 cents; firsts 50 cents pullet extras 48 cents. Prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extras 54 cents, firsts 52 cents; pullet extras 49 cents. Storage prices have again advanced and this class is now selling to retailers at extras 42 cents; firsts 40 cents; seconds 36 cents.

Vancouver: Prices on this market are steady and unchanged. Dealers are quoting producers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 35 cents; firsts 31 cents; pullet extras 29 cents.

St. John: This egg market is firm, under a good demand for all grades. Receipts continue light and prices are unchanged.

Halifax: All prices on this market have undergone a further advance. Dealers are now paying country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 38 cents to 40 cents; firsts 35 cents to 36 cents; seconds 28 cents to 30 cents; prices to retailers are extras 45 cents to 48 cents, firsts 42 cents to 43 cents, seconds 35 cents to 36 cents.
