Mr. Warren Burns, meteorologist at the Charlottetown Experimental Station, reported yesterday's temperature to be just slightly under 87. Last night at 8 o'clock the official thermometer gave the temperature as 76.

The barometer, which had been dropping steadily during the day, gave the hope of approaching much needed rainfall, was rising again. Unless electrical storms broke the heat wave continued hot dry weather was looked for.

Since the first of July the Experimental Station, Charlottetown, has recorded a total of 1.3 inches of rainfall during the first week in this month has amounted to 0.24 inches.
