SLIGHT INCREASE IN U-BOAT TOLL

LONDON.—The weekly British Admiralty statement shows that last week 14 British ships of more than 1,000 tons, four of under 1,000 tons, and eight fishing vessels were sunk by submarines or mines—a slight increase in tonnage over the previous week.

The official report follows: "Arrivals, 1,232; sailings, 1,290. "British merchant ships, sunk by mines or submarines, over 1,000 tons, including one previously 14; under 1,000 tons, 4.

"British merchant vessels unaccountably attacked, including three previously, 12.

"British fishing vessels sunk, 8." The Admiralty report of the previous week announced the sinking of 14 vessels of over 1,000 tons, and three of less than 1,000 tons. The fishing vessels lost numbered 7.

Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family on any date over eighteen years of age, may homestead a certain section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must apply to the Dominion Lands Agency, or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency, but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Dues—Six months residence in each of three years after carrying homestead patent; also 1/2 acre extra cultivation. Pre-completion patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

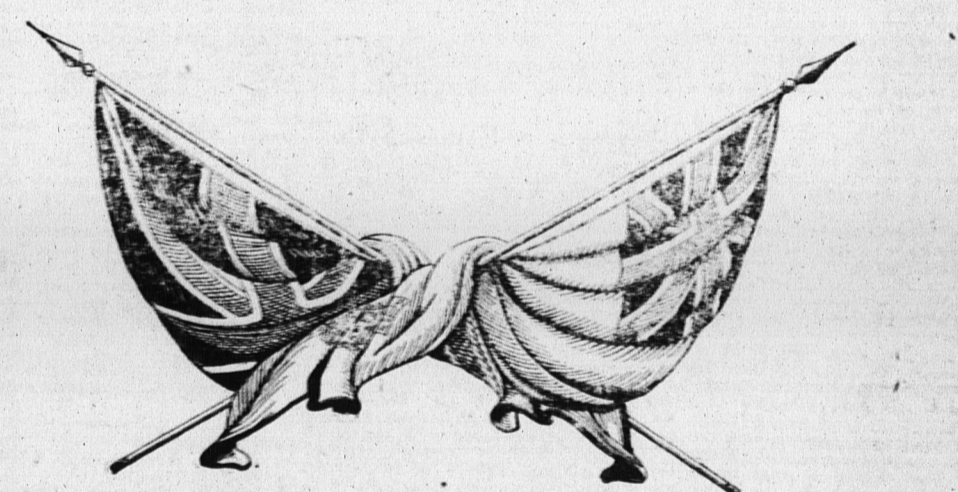
