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Paul Redfern, Flier, Thought Located

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Oct. 3.—(C.P. Cable)—A crippled white man living with the medicine man of a Dutch Guianan Indian tribe may be Paul Redfern, a United States airman who has not been seen since he set out on a South American flight eight years ago.

William Lavarre, an American explorer who returned to Trinidad from a trip into Guianan jungles, said he had definite evidence the flier's plane had crashed up in a landing forced by lack of gasoline. Both his legs were broken when he tried to set the plane down on a plateau in the interior and it overturned.

The explorer says he has forwarded the lost flier's hat and a piece of fabric and the wings from his airplane to the State Department in Washington as evidence he had traced Redfern. Lavarre is now returning to the United States to secure airplanes and equipment for a new expedition to search for Redfern.

The tribe the flier is supposed to be living with, has not been in contact with civilization for more than 25 years. Lavarre heard of the man and gathered the clues to his identification from Djuker tribesmen in the British Guiana hinterland.

Growing Use Of Electricity

There has been a great advance in the use of electricity for domestic purposes in Great Britain, bought about largely by lower cost to the consumer. In the greater proportion of the larger centres distribution of electrical energy is controlled by the municipal authorities. Stoves make up the greatest proportion of electrical appliances imported by Great Britain from Canada, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. South Africa is likewise showing a growing use of electricity in the household and here the Canadian electric stove also finds favour. In fact, Canada accounts for 74.6 per cent of all the electric stoves imported into the Union.

Fur Farming Manitoba Is Making Progress

WINNIPEG, Man. Oct. 3.—Manitoba's oldest industry—the trapping of fur-bearing animals and sale of their pelts—is staging a remarkable comeback after years of decline.

Hon. J. S. McDiarmid, minister of natural resources, pointed out here recently. The past 15 years have witnessed the development of fur ranching from two fur ranches in 1920 to 400 in Manitoba today, according to the Natural Resources Department of the Canadian National Railways. Within that space of time the fur industry has stepped into the front rank as one of the big three industries of the province, alongside farming and mining. This is proving an all-round impetus to business in general. The sale of pelts from Manitoba fur farms from 1931 to 1934 told the following story in figures for each fiscal year: 1931-32—9,421 pelts sold, value \$159,777; 1932-33—6,395 pelts sold, value \$133,893; 1933-34—10,053 pelts sold, value \$249,072.

CANADA STILL CHIEF SOURCE SUPPLY KINGDOM

Canada leads in the supply of wheat flour to the United Kingdom, according to import figures for the first six months of this year as compared with the same period 1934. Total imports, however, decreased approximately 30 per cent, states the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. A five year campaign is about to be undertaken in Britain having for its slogan "Eat More Bread."
