"Agreed," you may say. "But we have a free press. I read the paper every day. What's all this fuss about 'undertown'?"

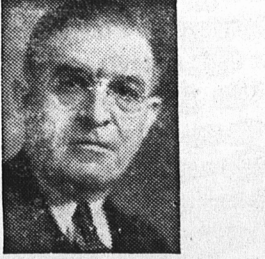
