CANADIAN GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES

All Deferred Annuity Contracts sold since April 19, 1948, or those sold in the future, and until further notice, will in the event of death at anytime before the Annuity is to begin draw 4% compound interest on the premiums paid instead of 3% as previously advertised.

An amendment to the Act must be passed before the 3% will become effective, but contracts sold prior to the passing of the amendment will not be affected.

TO ILLUSTRATE the advantage in purchasing now—A male age 25 buying an annuity of \$100.00 per month, beginning at age 65, would cost him \$16.68 per month, if he died at say age 64, all his money would be returned with 4% compound interest amounting to \$19,415.00. While under the 3% proposed rate, his Estate would receive \$15,328.00, in each case he had paid in \$7,806.00.

Young Corps Celebrates Birthday

Inspection of troops of the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers School, Barrisfield, Ont., was one of the highlights of the biggest birthday celebration held in recent years by an army establishment at Kingston. The occasion was the fifth anniversary of the formation of the ROEME as a corps.

Brig. L. M. Chesley, OBE, ED, vice-deputy quartermaster-general, Army Headquarters, Ottawa, was inspecting officer. Spectators who lined the huge square in the camp area were informed of proceedings by means of a public address system installed by technicians of the ROEME School.

The inspecting officer was accompanied by Lt.-Col. G. M. C. Sprung, MC, Army Headquarters, Ottawa, and Lieut. R. H. Mahar, of the North Nova Scotia Highlanders, attached to ROEME School, aide-de-camp.

Brig. Chesley thoroughly inspected the three companies on parade while the ROEME bugle band played inspection marches. After the inspection, Col. W. S. Hunt, officer commanding the school, son of Mrs. L. B. Hunt, Charlottetown, led his men as they marched past the reviewing stand in column of platoons and in column of route. Maj. G. Thompson was second-in-command of parade.

After the advance in review order, Brig. Chesley presented competition trophies. Capt. C. G. Provan, on behalf of Vehicle Company, received the bowling trophy. Craftsman K. L. Moore, on behalf of Artisan Company, received the cross-country competition award. Cfmn. Moore was also the highest-scoring runner in the cross-country event. Cfmn. Arthur Roy on behalf of the privates' rifle team, received the marksmanship award. Three teams had competed for this trophy—privates, NCO's and officers.

Spectators were impressed by the smartness and proficiency of the technical specialists who demonstrated that they were soldiers as well as craftsmen. The band, composed of men who perform their regular duties and do much of their practice in their spare time turned in a fine performance. In charge of the band was Sgt. W. E. Hendon, who regularly instructs in the corps' general military training.

Men with only five weeks of army experience, formed in a precision drill platoon, demonstrated what can be accomplished in 30-day days of intensive training. Spectators were informed that the recruit platoon had not been specially selected but was a regular GMT platoon. At the end of their exhibition, during which several drill and arms movements were made without word of command, the spectators applauded enthusiastically. In charge of the platoon was Sgt. R. S. Brennan of Kingston.

Keen observers during the inspection, review, presentations and drill were Lt.-Col. A. H. Campbell and Lt.-Col. R. H. Ramsey, both deputy directors of mechanical engineers, Army Headquarters, Ottawa.

The training wing of the ROEME School is divided into five companies for instructional purposes—corps' general military training, artisan, armament, tele-communications and vehicle, most of which are sub-divided into specialist groups. For the parade, however, three companies were formed.

Ceremonies over, the ROEME men, late in the afternoon, attended a special birthday steak dinner. In the evening all ranks attended a monster regimental dance in the large drill hall in the camp.

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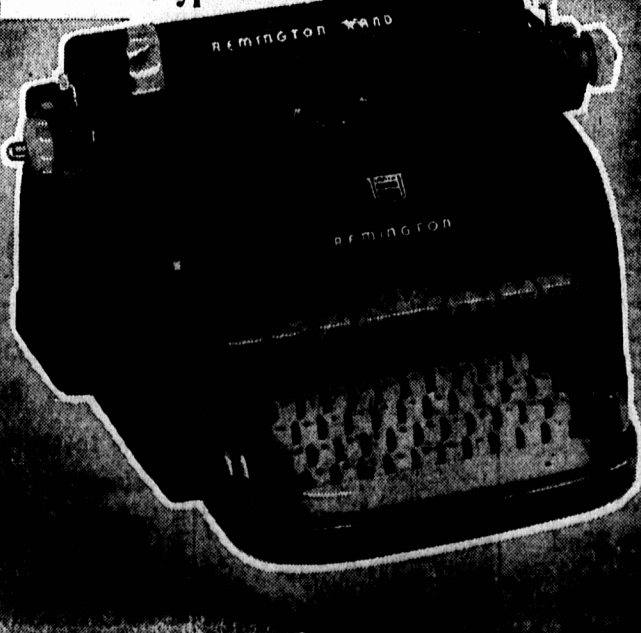
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
