



To West Indies

MONTREAL, Que., May 8.—The Freiburg Passion Players, who have presented their spectacle in Canada and the United States for the past five years, intend staging the play in Jamaica, if the visit of an advance party to the British colony is successful. George Fassnacht, owner, Mrs. Fassnacht, and Nico Do-tach, manager, have sailed from Montreal aboard the Canadian National liner "Lady Somers" with that object in view. Some 300 cubic feet of scenery were taken to Jamaica on the "Lady Somers" with the party in anticipation of the showing in Kingston, capital of the colony. It is understood the Passion players will then proceed to Cuba, Guatemala, Australia, Japan and Germany.

Imported Eggs

The March imports of eggs in the shell, 4,267 dozen, were less than half the 10,794 dozen imported a year ago. The import from the United States was 3,125 dozen and from Hong Kong 1,142. Frozen and dried eggs from China were 1,000 pounds at \$519 and 650 at \$585 from the United States. In March, 1932, the total was 17,034 pounds.

It demands the early restoration of the salary scale of 1930 and urges the raising of the school leaving age for pupils without delay. The teachers' pay was reduced in 1931.

Progress Made
By Advanced Swine Registry

As a result of the acceptance by the Canadian Swine Breeders' Association of the Advanced Registry Policy, a new swine pedigree will be used in future by the Canadian National Live Stock Records, which will embody the information supplied through the Advanced Registry record. In addition to the name and registration number of the animal, as heretofore shown on the pedigree, it will also show in the second generation the number of qualified progeny of the animal, and at the bottom of the pedigree, the official score secured in the case of qualified sows.

Advanced Registry now is placed in a position to be of a definite service in connection with the swine record. In Prince Edward Island at the present time, in the neighbourhood of thirty registered sows are entered in this Policy.

"Wellington" Play
Has Feeble Ending

LONDON, May 8.—(C.P.)—Plays of the full-length portrait style have been rather in favor recently. Matheson Lang adds another in presenting "Wellington." The early performances have taken place in Leeds.

The Duke—of course he was then only Sir Arthur Wellesley—is introduced to us during the Peninsula Campaign. There is a colorful scene of the famous Ball before Waterloo. We then move on to behold Wellington striving for the peace of Europe with representatives of the other victorious Powers. Seventeen years later we find him, no long soldier but statesman, in the Parliamentary campaign of the Reform Bill, when he was reviled both by the mob and his fellow peers. All through the play there is the romantic element concerned with "Harriet Arbuthnot," the friend, counsellor and true love of Wellington, who is depicted as dying in his arms.

Perhaps the weakest feature is at the end, when the Iron Duke himself is at death's door in Walmer Castle. The play presents him at this juncture as reciting a long review of his career. Like Charles the Second the Duke of the play seems to take a long time a-dying. This wordy farewell is hardly what we should expect from the great soldier who said (or never did say) "Up guards, and at 'em."

Nevertheless, Robin Miller, the Glasgow author, is to be congratulated both upon having written a play of extreme interest and of having been fortunate enough to secure the co-operation of so eminent an actor as Matheson Lang.

West Going East

WINNIPEG, Man., May 8.—A generation or so ago Western Canada was the goal of settlers but recently the process was reversed when a special car was attached to a Canadian National Railway train conveying two families from Mountain Road, near Eden, Man., to Grimsby Ont. There were nineteen persons in all comprised of the families of Wasyi Laba and Mike Romak, who will take up fruit farming near Grimsby. It was the first train ride any of the children ever had. Both fathers came from Australia, Laba coming with his father in 1898, and marrying a woman of his own country who had come to Canada four years later. Romak's wife is also an Australian. Relatives of both families are already settled in the Grimsby district.

BRILLIANT STUDENT.

Friends of Mr. Thomas R. Millman, B. A. of Kensington will be pleased to learn of his splendid showing in the final year of his theological course at Wycliffe College, Toronto. At the Annual Convocation held on April 20th he received the regular diploma also the L. Th., and the following prizes. The Fourth Bishop of Toronto Prize, the Prize for Church History and the General Proficiency Prize. Mr. Millman is remaining in Toronto to complete his M. A. course and expects to receive ordination on Trinity Sunday, June 11th, after which he will take up work in the parish of Grafton near Coburg, Ont. His many friends wish him success in his chosen work.

MUSIC RECITAL ENJOYED.

A very interesting and enjoyable recital was given at Trinity United Church, Sunday evening, consisting entirely of works by Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy. It is not too much to say that the whole recital was an outstanding musical event and although not attended as well as it merited, those who had the privilege of hearing the recital were given a rare treat. The soloists, Mr. James Calder in "It is Enough" from "Elijah," Miss Margaret Sterns in "I will sing of Thy great mercies," from St. Paul, and Mr. Harvey MacPherson in the solo part in the "Ninety-fifth Psalm" acquitted themselves in a highly creditable manner. The organ numbers by Mr. Kendall consisted of the second Sonata in C Minor, D Minor prelude and the ever popular Duetto, from the "Songs without words," were played in good taste and in a manner reflecting credit on the performer. The choir did magnificently in the chorus work of the "Ninety-fifth Psalm" and are to be congratulated.

Surprised At Strength

The display of the Milicia, which previously had been semi-secret, left the capital almost gasping with surprise at the strength of the first potent civil law enforcement body since Diego Portales formed a civic guard 100 years ago.

It was because he failed in an attempt to dissuade the Fascist leaders from conducting the parade that Horatio Hevia, Premier and Minister of the Interior, resigned last night. Political leaders met at once to discuss the situation.

In the first line of the parade was the Fascist commander-in-chief, large, smiling, Eulogio Sanchez Erzuruz, who with some 20 other men began organizing the Milicia after Colonel Marmaduke Grove and Dr. Carlos Davila, one time provisional President, seized the power from President Juan Ssteban Montero on June 4, 1932.

Commander Cheered

Domingo Duran, Minister of Education and Justice, a regimental commander of the Milicia, received almost continuous applause, his activities and President Alessandri's refusal to halt the parade led Hevia to resign.

MONTREAL, Que. May 8.—Baby chicks are among the most exacting "passengers" that a railway can carry, states the Canadian National Express, which annually transports hundreds of thousands of them. They must not be placed too near steam-heated pipes, nor must they be allowed to stand in draughts, in hot sunshine or in rain. Lastly and most unexpectedly, while travelling they must not be fed or watered.

Imports of butter in March totalled 221,394 pounds valued at \$32,829 compared with 467,581 at \$77,812 in February and 94,583 at \$18,795 in March, 1932. In March of this year the quantity from New Zealand was 212,731 pounds, Great Britain 8,064 and United States 600.

FASCISTS PARADE IN SANTIAGO

Force of Eleven Thousand, Known as the National Militia Republicana, Parade For First Time.

SANTIAGO, Chile, May 8.—(A.P.)—Eleven thousand Fascists, members of the powerful, National Militia Republicana, paraded through downtown streets here today while political leaders sought to solve a Cabinet crisis created by the emergence of the organization.

A crowd estimated at more than 400,000 witnessed the first public display of the militia's power. It is a civilian organization formed on military lines with the avowed purpose of supporting a constitutional government and preventing De Facto regimes in Chile.

A squadron of Fascist planes flew overhead as the units, unarmed, marched through the vast boulevard Alameda and past the presidential palace where they saluted President Alessandri and government leaders.
