

Canadians Have Radio Location Unit

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, March 8—(CP Cable)—The Canadian army has mobilized a radio location unit, first of its kind in the world.

The personnel has been selected from the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals and a survey regiment of the Royal Canadian Artillery in England being trained exclusively in radio location. The unit will operate in the field with the Canadian army aircraft regiment in plotting enemy aircraft from guns with instruments which the Canadians have taken a leading role in developing.

Britain's army has used radio location for a considerable time but its units are manned by gunners as part of the anti-aircraft gunners' battery. The Canadian unit is a new and independent departure.

For the last six months the Canadians in this unit have served on loan with the British anti-aircraft gunners operating radio location equipment. They saw action in a heavy air raid as they stalked enemy air raiders for the artillery. Commanding the unit is Maj. F. F. Fulton, Montreal, member of the R.C.S., a former sales manager in a large Canadian electrical company. Most officers are electrical engineers in civil life.

More than a year ago Britain asked for assistance from Canadians in manning and maintaining radio location equipment. A detachment of a survey regiment and some members of the signal corps were loaned to the British command for the purpose. Originally it was intended that these troops would return to their parent unit after six months.

In the meantime, however, developments in radio location indicated the formation of a Canadian unit was desirable and the radio location unit was mobilized in England.

Canadiens Win In Overtime From Boston

MONTREAL, March 8—(CP)—The battle for the important sixth place in the National Hockey League standing—last qualifying berth for the playoffs—swung in favor of Canadiens here last night when they scored a 4-3 overtime victory against Boston Bruins before a crowd of 13,351.

Victory over the third-place Bruins lifted the Canadiens a full game ahead of the cellar-placed Brooklyn Americans and left them only one point away from fifth place in the standing, held by Detroit Red Wings.

In as rousing a game seen here this season, Canadiens came roaring back in the extra session to win after squaring the issue with less than three minutes of the regular time left. Little Joe Benoit scored the payoff marker at 5:37 of the overtime on a neat passing play with Terry Reardon and Toe Blake.

Before that, Canadiens had been fighting from behind a 3-2 deficit when Herb Cain took Art Jackson's pass to score midway through the second period and break a tie which existed from the opening period.

It looked as though the Hub team would hold onto their slim edge as the game neared its close, but at 17:40 of the third period, big Red Goupille broke loose from his own defence post, whipped the puck to Ray Gettiffe on the far right boards and the latter let go a beautiful angle shot which caught the far corner of Frank Brimsek's cage.

Boston had got away to a good start against the Habitués when Roy Conacher talked shortly after seven minutes of play. A penalty to Desse Smith erased the edge, however, as Terry Reardon and Benoit scored goals within 45 seconds of each other for Canadiens. Then with six seconds of the period remaining, Boston moved back on even terms as Conacher took Eddie Whitman's pass near the Canadian goal mouth for his second goal.

Although having to battle uphill for their victory, Canadiens played sounder hockey than their opponents. Bruins looked woefully weak on defence and would probably have suffered a humiliating defeat only for the capable goaling of Brimsek.

Both clubs presented newcomers on their lineups before Montreal fans. Boston had Lloyd Grenadal, Clare Martin and Jack McGill in first appearances, while Jim Haggarty, up from Montreal amateur ranks, made his debut in pro livery with Canadiens.

Jim Henry Scores First N. H. L. Shutout To Give Rangers Split In Games

NEW YORK, March 8—(CP)—Goose Jim Henry finally got his coveted first National Hockey League shutout tonight as the New York Rangers defeated the second-place Toronto Maple Leafs 2-0 before a near-capacity crowd of 15,263 fans at Madison Square Garden.

The victory, coming after the Leafs had defeated the Rangers at Toronto 4-2 Saturday night, restored the New Yorkers' lead of three points and greatly improved their chance of finishing on top of the league standing.

As regarded as about on a par with battling 400 in major-league ball, Patrick attained the 30-goal mark by lopping in a pass from Paul Watson in the first period. The last player to get 30 or more was Charlie Conacher, then right winger with the Toronto Maple Leafs, who got 36 in 1934-35 and 32 in 1933-34.

The other goal of the night was credited to Watson, whose pass-out from behind the cage carried off Wally Stanowski's leg into the Leaf net. Watson also drew a 10-minute misconduct penalty for swinging at Burke McDonald in the third period.

SATURDAY'S GAME

TORONTO, March 8—(CP)—A preview of the expected Stanley Cup semi-final series between Toronto Maple Leafs and New York Rangers was staged here Saturday night before 13,902 customers and the two clubs supplied a spectacle that will be difficult to equal when the National Hockey League gets down to the real business of playing for the historic hockey trophy.

It was the second last meeting between the league's two leading clubs in the regular schedule—they close out their schedule against one another in New York tonight—and the Leafs won 4-2 to cut the Rangers' lead to one point.

The result must have given coach Frankie Boulter of the Rangers something to puzzle about. His club scored that all-important first goal and outplayed the Leafs most of the time, spending many successive minutes in the Toronto defence zone hammering away at Willie Turk Broda.

STORMY IRISH FIGURE DIES

DUBLIN, March 8—(CP)—Mary MacSwiney, sister of Terence MacSwiney, the mayor of Cork who died in Britain jail in 1920 while on a hunger strike for Irish freedom, and a stormy figure in her own right died Saturday. It was announced today.

Mrs. MacSwiney, who gained much publicity for the cause of Irish freedom by her numerous hunger strikes in the 20's, was president of the Sinn Fein executive council in 1926 but was defeated in the Irish elections in 1927.
