It was intended to bring out the joyfulness of the home life among the East Indians. Miss Millie Green, who had spent several years with her brother, the Rev. W. L. Green, a Presbyterian Missionary in Trinidad, had trained the Band and gave every detail of costume and custom its proper place. In the play there were nine scenes: 1—Preliminary Arrangement; 2—The Match Maker; 3—Bargaining; 4— Betrothal Ceremony; 5—The Marriage Day, Morning Worship; 6—Preliminary; 7—The Ceremony; 8—Widowhood; 9—Final Appeal. The final appeal—the appeal to Christ—of the singing of "At Home, London" was deeply impressive and highly dramatic. The Rev. Mr. Green, who is at home resting after a serious illness was present and gave a short and very effective closing address. The Rev. George Miller of New London presided. Between the scenes, the children of the Band gave numerous recitations, songs and choruses. The Hall was filled to its fullest capacity.

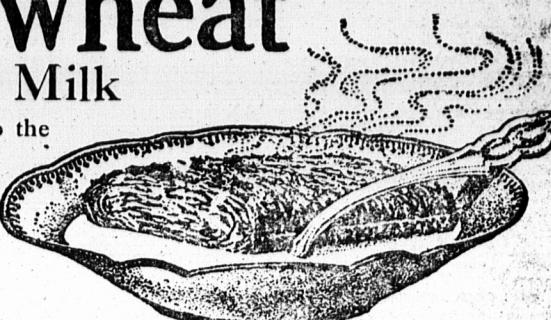
